

Truman Famine Group Wants Relief Pep-Up

WASHINGTON, May 2 (AP)—President Truman's famine emergency committee appealed today for energetic community campaigns throughout the land to conserve food for famine relief.

The nation's mayors were called upon individually to get these drives rolling by setting up local famine emergency committees that will enlist the united efforts of the community's leadership.

Other top developments in the overall food picture:

1. Increased black market traffic in butter was indicated by an agriculture department report, which said stocks available at regular outlets, seemed to decline last month despite moderate gains in the amount of butter produced.

2. Secretary of Agriculture Clinton P. Anderson voiced in-

creased optimism over prospects for a bumper wheat crop. He said the crop is maturing two weeks earlier than normally in most wheat areas and called this an encouraging sign.

3. Ruins in the Northern Plains regions extending as far south as Kansas yesterday made welcome news for crop exports, for an earlier weather bureau report stated that rain was urgently needed in several parts of the area.

4. The agriculture department announced it will continue to make food purchases for foreign governments after July 1 because of the current crisis. These are for food-short nations who are ineligible for UNRRA aid and able to repay this country for the supplies.

5. The way was cleared for the opening May 12 of a nationwide emergency food collection campaign which will solicit contributions of canned goods and cash for famine relief. Secretary of Commerce Wallace, national chairman for this drive, and UNRRA Director General LaGuardia ironed out their differences over how it should operate.

The appeal for community famine emergency campaigns went out to the mayors in letters from Chairman Chester Davis, who suggested that the local committees be headed by civic leaders who will give "real" time and energy to the work. Stressing the urgency of the situation, Davis recommended the committees include representatives of civic and religious organizations, labor, hotels, restaurants, retailers, veterans, schools, newspapers, broadcasters, advertisers and other appropriate groups.

Board Quits In OPA Tiff

VANCOUVER, Wash., May 2 (AP)—Clark county OPA board was without a volunteer price panel today after its 11 members resigned in protest against OPA policies.

F. H. B. Richards, panel chairman, announced yesterday the resignation of all volunteer price advisors and issued a statement in which he declared OPA's purpose of enforcing compliance with price control regulation has been "forgotten."

He said district OPA officials no longer "make any allowance for any legitimate mistake" by a merchant and "penalties and fines" remain the sole purpose of the agency.

McDonnell Brown, district OPA administrator, retorted that "there has been no change in policies of the OPA, nor is any contemplated."

CPA Approves Oregon Funds

PORTLAND, May 2 (AP)—Construction for non-housing building approved today for Oregon totaled \$2,699,250, the civilian production adminis-
tration office reported, with up-
state projects representing the bulk of the work.

Oregon CPA Director Nelson English announced the \$125,000 Consolidated Union high school at Springfield, a \$721,000 ply-wood plant for the Fir-Pine Ply-wood company, Myrtle Creek, and a total of \$400,000 in buildings for Oregon Fairview homes, Salem, headed the up-

state building given the go-ahead.
Others approved were: \$80,000 for 20 metal quonset huts at Oregon State college, Corvallis, for use as offices, labs and classrooms; \$34,000 for Valley Fruit and Produce company, Salem, for a food storage and processing plant; \$35,000 for a fruit packing plant by Harry and David, Medford.
