

RFC Extension Asked By President Truman

WASHINGTON, May 2 (AP)—Describing the reconstruction finance corporation as a major instrumentality for conducting postwar government business activities, President Truman today recommended that its statutory authority be extended beyond the present January 22, 1947, expiration date.

The president also again told congress that legislation providing premium payment subsidies to finance expansion of building materials was essential to provide an adequate supply of housing for returning veterans.

These recommendations were contained in a message transmitting the next fiscal year's budget proposal for all wholly-owned government corporations.

The export-import bank, Mr. Truman said, anticipates disbursements which may run as high as \$2,000,000,000 on loans to finance purchase of American commodities and to provide the necessary minimum credit

for postwar reconstruction abroad.

The president asserted that he regretted the necessity for saying that the continuance of several wartime subsidies was necessary "to hold the line against the forces of inflation," adding:

"I have said before, and I repeat here, they will be reduced and discontinued promptly as soon as the inflationary pressure slackens. I hope and expect this will occur by the end of the fiscal year 1947."

OREGON CITY, May 2 (AP)—The U. S. employment service here today reported more jobs available than "ever before in the history of this office."

R. A. Blyth, USES manager, said Clackamas county logging camps need so many workers that not a single one is operating up to full capacity.

In this region, he said, unemployment is caused, not by lack of work, but by difficulty fitting the jobless to available jobs.

A lawsuit for \$5000 damages, growing out of a freak truck-train-pedestrian accident last December 15 at the Altamont crossing of the OC&E railroad has been filed with the circuit clerk.

The pedestrian, Harvey Walker, placed the suit against Larry Goerges, driver of the Richfield oil truck involved, and Jack Eichendorf, owner of the vehicle.

Walker was walking down the right-of-way adjacent to the tracks when the wreck occurred. He charges that Goerges approached the crossing driving in such a manner that he failed to see the locomotive also approaching the crossing and when the truck hit the locomotive it careened off and hit him.

Walker said that he received several fractured ribs, lacerations on his chest and mouth and that some of his teeth were broken off. U. S. Balentine is representing Walker.
