

High School Songsters To Compete At Eugene

Klamath Union high school students of the music department, who have worked hard to qualify for the trip, leave this weekend to enter national competition at Eugene. The band, a capella choir, girls ensemble, clarinet quartet and three soloists will participate May 3 and 4. All will take part in competition Friday with the exception of the band and choir. These two groups will appear Saturday, according to Andrew Loney Jr., director of music education.

This is the first time in the history of the school that students have appeared at the national competition for Region 1, and the trip was made possible by donations from townspeople.

Private cars and buses will take the boys and girls north. Mrs. Margaret Strode will accompany the group to Eugene to serve as chaperone for the girls. Also attending with Loney will be John O'Connor and John Best of the music department.

Loney said today that students attending competition will be required to attend as much of the two-day program as possible as the main purpose of the trip is to acquaint boys and girls with the type of work done in other schools. He also stressed to the students that regardless of the rating received by Klamath students, he felt the trip would be well worthwhile as it will give the participants the opportunity to hear the top organizations and soloists in the northwest.

Final rites will not be announced by Ward's until word comes from a son, Dale, now with the army in Germany. Mrs. Johnson and four children survive. Mr. Johnson was a native of Asheville, N. C., and moved to this city in 1911.
