

OPA Called 'Papa Of Inflation'

SEATTLE, May 3 (AP)—The public's only hope of lower prices, abundant supplies and acceptable quality is the complete abolition of the office of price administration and a return to all-out competitive production, President Robert S. Wason of the National Association of Manufacturers declared at a news conference yesterday.

He referred to the OPA as the "papa of inflation."

Asked if the abolition of OPA would mean immediate higher prices, Wason said they would "undoubtedly" be higher than "visible" prices, which do not take into account subsidies, black markets and deterioration of quality.

Wason charged that the OPA had not only failed to control inflation but that it was a major contributing cause to inflation now under way.

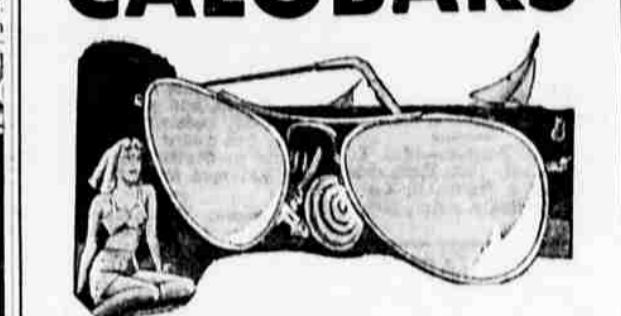

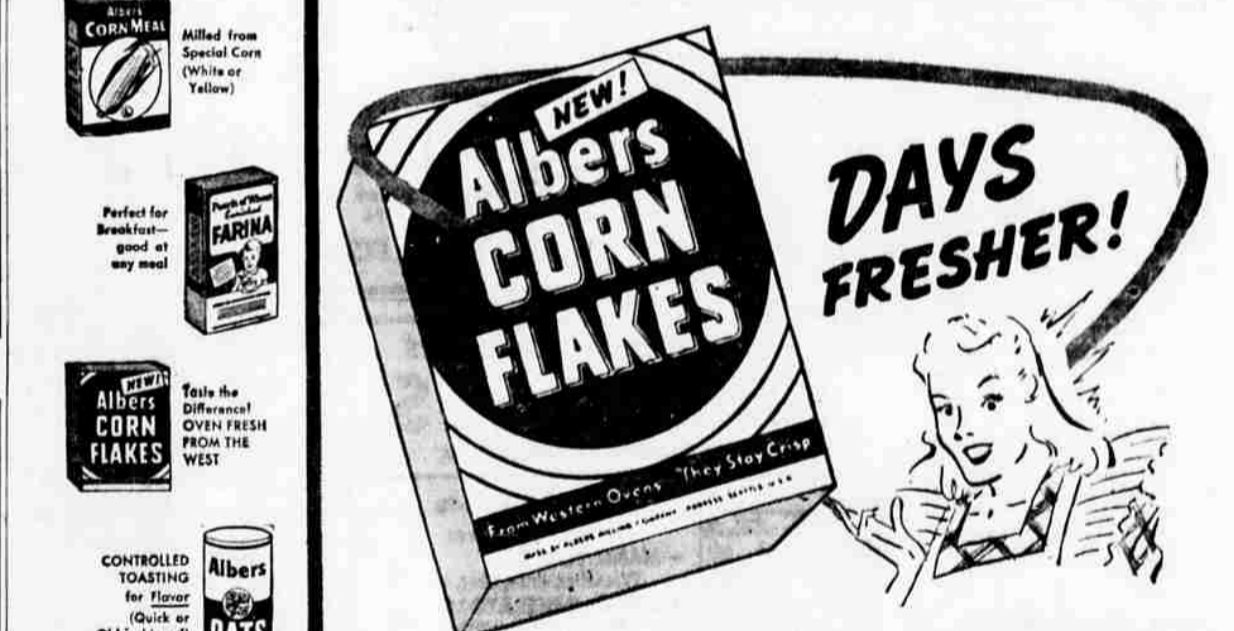
