

McNary Dam Funds Approved By Truman

WASHINGTON, May 3 (AP)—The long-awaited green light flashed today for construction of McNary dam, three Willamette basin dams, and other river, harbor, and flood control work in Oregon.

The war department civil functions appropriation bill signed by President Truman provides \$9,594,500 for work in Oregon—most of it for preliminary work on McNary dam on the Columbia river, and on three Willamette basin dams: Detroit, Dorena, and Lookout Point (Meridian).

The allocation of \$2,600,000

for McNary, \$2,018,200 for Dorena, \$1,700,000 for Detroit, and \$1,000,000 for Meridian dam will cover railroad and highway relocation, construction of buildings, and possibly—in the case of Dorena dam—some actual work on the dam itself.

Two other dams which will eventually be part of the seven-dam Willamette basin flood control project were also included in the appropriations: \$130,000 for advance planning of the Quartz Creek reservoir and \$100,000 for advance planning of the Sweet Home reservoir. Two dams in the network are already built.

The bill signed by the president also allocates \$239,000 for work on the Columbia river between Bonneville and Vancouver; \$805,800 for Columbia river work at Bonneville; and \$30,000 for Columbia river and tributaries above Celilo falls. A sum of \$450,000 was appropriated for Willamette river bank protection.

Other sums which will be used for planning Oregon projects: Rivers and harbors—Chico river, \$2000; Depoe bay, \$1000; Snake river, \$500,000; flood control—Cowlitz river, \$12,000; Nehalem river, \$2500; Alkali canyon, Arlington, \$4000.
