

Acorns, Angels Gain On Seals; Sacs To Cellar

That clippity-clop the San Francisco Seals must be hearing is the rapid approach of the Oakland Oaks and Los Angeles Angels in a gallop to capture the Pacific Coast league baseball lead.

While Oakland was overcoming Hollywood, 3-1, last night, the Angels were blanking the Seals, 6-0, behind the four-hit pitching of Yank Terry.

The Oaks held a two to one edge over the Stars and the Los Angeles win, highlighted by a four-run, fifth inning, gave the Angels the same margin over the Seals in the series so far. When the tallies were all in, Oakland stood two games behind San Francisco and Los Angeles three.

San Diego shoved Sacramento into the league cellar with a 6-5 win established in the eighth inning by four Padre runs. This spurge, aided considerably by S. W. E. Jensen's triple which brought in two mates, broke a two-all tie. The Sacs tried hard in the ninth, but could muster only three runs.

Seattle's Rainiers defeated the Portland Beavers, 8-2, thereby assisting considerably in bringing about the swap that moved them into seventh place and Sacramento to the league bottom. The Rainiers touched Ad Liska and Don Pulford for 14 hits, while the Beavers could collect but six off Jim Tobin.

Olsen May Go To Sox

Jim Olsen, who hurled for the Klamath naval air station during the navy's series of games with Camp White in 1944, is still in town and has been contacted by a scout for the Boston Red Sox who would like for him to come to Boston this year.

Olsen is a native of Everett, Wash., played high school ball there and before his navy service pitched for the San Diego Padres.

The Red Sox have a tie-up with the Padres and the right-hander was optioned to the Sox by the Padres for \$22,000 but was exempted from reporting for a year after his war service because of injuries.

Now George K. Stevens, Red Sox scout, has come to Klamath looking for Jim. The Sox have upped their offer to the Padres to \$35,000 and want Olsen to report this year.

Olsen had planned to do some pitching for the Klamath Falls baseball team this summer but now is undecided what to do. He is to have some more talk with the Bostonians before making up his mind.

The pitcher is scheduled to be interviewed over Don Neal's KFLW Sports Lineup at 5:45 this afternoon and may divulge his future plans then.

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Cards Have Tough Luck With Lefty

St. Louis Knocked Out Of First; Sox Sweep Series With Bengals

It looked today as if the National league will southpaw the favored St. Louis Cardinals to death in an attempt to keep the Red Birds from wresting the pennant from the Chicago Cubs.

In 14 games this season, opposing managers have thrown eight left-handers against Eddie Dyer's sluggers and have been rewarded with four victories. Altogether the Cards have dropped five games, only one to a righthander.

The latest lefty to haunt the cards was Dave Koslo, New York Giants hopeful, who handcuffed them with four hits yesterday and whipped them, 5-1, to knock St. Louis out of a first place tie with Brooklyn.

Third Straight Defeat
The Giants not only handed the Cards their third straight defeat, but had the satisfaction of knocking off an old nemesis when they drove Elmer Harry Breen out of the hill with a four-run uprising in the ninth inning which snapped a 1-1 deadlock.

The Dodgers came from behind to shackle the Cubs, 3-2, when Billy Herman, a former Bruin, hit a pinch single in the eighth inning to bat across Pete Reiser and Dixie Walker with the tying and winning runs.

Boston's favorite pun-up boy, Ted Williams, slammed a 10th inning home run to give the American league leading Red Sox a 5-4 victory over the Detroit Tigers and a clean sweep of the three game series.

The Yankees clung close to the Six' heels by trimming the Cleveland Indians, 8-2, behind the effective nine-hit hurling of Spud Chandler, who became the first big league moundsman to register four victories.

Banged around for two straight days by the Philadelphia Athletics, the St. Louis Browns finally came to life with a 16-hit barrage against a trio of Mack-men hurlers to defeat their tormentors, 10-3.

Lefty Fitz Ostermueller pitched a steady game against the Philadelphia Phillies while his Pittsburgh Pirate mates took advantage of a big five-run frame to topple the Phils, 8-3.

The scheduled Boston Braves-Cincinnati Reds contest was rained out, while Washington and the Chicago White Sox were not scheduled.

Cal Loop Opens Slate Tonight
LOS ANGELES, May 3 (AP)—The California baseball league, a light, six-club, class C circuit, kicks off tonight its first season since before the war.

With a 130-game schedule, the loop has attracted major league support at four points: The St. Louis Cards are backing Fresno, the Cleveland Indians are behind Bakersfield, the Chicago Cubs operate Visalia, and Santa Barbara is perhaps the most dignified link in "da bums' chain" of the Brooklyn Dodgers.

Only Stockton and Modesto are independents. In two seasons of play, 1941 and 1942, the league developed such prospects as Pitchers Hal Gregg and Vic Lombardi, and Outfielder Dick Whitman, all now with the Dodgers; Chet Johnson, St. Louis Browns, and Rex Cecil, ex-Boston Red Sox.

Joe Walcott Gets To Garden
NEW YORK, May 3 (AP)—Jersey Joe Walcott, 31-year-old father of six children and up-set conquerer of Jimmy Bivins at Cleveland several months ago, finally has landed in a main bout at Madison Square Garden.

Climaxing weeks of negotiations by Walcott's trio of associates, Felix Boicchio, Vic Marullo and Joe Webster, Promoter Mike Jacobs announced yesterday that he had matched Jersey Joe with Detroit's Lee Oma in a 10-round bout at Garden for May 24. The bout replaced the welterweight title match between Marty Servo and Ray "Sugar" Robinson, originally scheduled for that date.

Ortiz Will Defend Bantamweight Title
HOLLYWOOD, May 3 (AP)—Manuel Ortiz, world bantamweight boxing king, will defend his title in a 15-round battle here May 18 with Kenny Lindsay, Canadian titleholder.

Ortiz, El Centro, Calif., rancher, has defended his title successfully 13 times. This will be the second meeting for Ortiz and Lindsay. The Canadian champion lost a hard-fought 10-round bout to the California fighter at Portland, Ore., three years ago.

Ryan Hopes To Take Pels To State Baseball Finals

Pelican Coach Ed Ryan has high hopes of taking his K-men to the state high school baseball championship meet in Portland May 23, 24 and 25, but still has a couple of rows to hoe before buying any tickets.

The two rows are Grants Pass and Medford, the next two Pelican games, both of which will be played here.

There will be eight A teams and four B teams selected from all over Oregon to compete in the championship meet and Klamath county, represented by the Pelicans, is lumped with Jefferson, Crook, Deschutes, Lake, Douglas, Coos, Curry, Josephine and Jackson counties in the southern Oregon district.

Chosen by Committee
One team will represent that whole territory in the tourney, the team to be selected by a committee composed of Stanley Woodruff of Klamath, Omer Monger of Roseburg and Earl Rogers of Ashland.

The Pelicans have already trounced Ashland and Medford and have lost to Grants Pass. It would take a win over the Gee-Pees in their game here to give the Pels a lock-in for a tourney bid.

There probably will not be any competition between teams in the other counties and the big four down there and the squad representing southern Oregon will be selected by the committee. The committee must choose and have their selection of a representative from the district mailed in to Portland by May 17.

No Class B District
As for the class B teams, no districts are set up and those teams will be chosen at large. In the class A tourney, in addition to the one team from down here, there will be one from eastern Oregon, two from up in the Tillamook and Multnomah areas, two from the Willamette valley and one Portland school.

The series is to be played on the University of Portland diamond. Qualifying rounds for the President's Cup tourney will be played Saturday afternoon and Sunday with about 25 four-somes slated to take the field in the preliminary rounds.

The tourney will be played two weeks from this coming weekend with Harry Panning defending his championship for the cup. Saturday's round gets underway at 1 p. m. and the Sunday play at 8 a. m. Players are requested to contact their opponents as listed. All qualifying scores are to be turned in to Chairman Moon Mullis or Laddie Selkirik. USGA rules will be observed.

Dissension In Team Loses Match For Belcastro, Ross
