

Zion Lutherans Slate Movie On Bible Theme

Zion Lutheran church is showing a Biblical sound film, "The Blind Beggar of Jerusalem," in its church auditorium, 1025 High street, on Sunday evening, May 5, at 7:30 o'clock.

"The Blind Beggar of Jerusalem," based on the ninth chapter of the Gospel according to St. John, is a gripping story that explains why Jesus so vigorously opposed the religious leaders of his people. Outside the gates of the temple sat a beggar, blind from birth. He was healed by Jesus. This splendid film, produced by the Cathedral Films company, gives a vivid presentation of the growing hatred of the temple authorities for the Master, and of their attempt to force the beggar to deny the miracle and discredit the power of Jesus.

A group of selected shorts will also be shown, including a Hymnologue in color, and inter-American film, "The Bridge," and a biographical film on the career of Franklin D. Roosevelt—from 1910 to his death, in 1945. The running time for the films will be approximately an hour and a half. There will be no admission charge. The public is cordially invited to attend.

Washington Forest Fire On Rampage

PORTLAND, May 3 (AP)—Flames were still raging uncontrolled over reforested land southeast of Yaocot, Wash., today in the wake of the season's first hot, humid fire weather.

Fire wardens reported from 10,000 to 15,000 acres blackened between Bell mountain and Dole valley. Some 65 men—40 on the west side and 25 on the east—were battling the blaze with bulldozers.

On the east side, Fire warden Glenn Messner, Yaocot, reported decreasing wind had enabled his men to keep the fire from spreading backward.

In Oregon, where a dozen blazes erupted yesterday, fire fighters took a breather after checking flames that blackened several hundred acres. One blaze destroyed a barn, with a few rabbits and chickens.

Hope for Weather Break

A fire that broke out on the Spokane, Portland & Seattle right of way near Buxton, Ore., was brought under control at midnight after eating about 300 acres. Twenty-five of 100 fire-fighters remained to mop up.

Through the northwest, fire patrols hoped for respite in the weather bureau's forecast of rising humidity and slightly falling temperatures. The maximum temperature forecast for today here was 75, compared to yesterday's 64.

Light, variable winds were forecast to succeed the east wind which fanned fires yesterday.

Dock Workers Near Agreement

PORTLAND, May 3 (AP)—Settlement of Portland's waterfront dispute, which has tied up harbor activity since Monday, awaits only formal signing of an agreement by members of union and employer groups, a federal conciliator said today.

Oliver Goodwin reported the agreement was reached yesterday by committees representing the waterfront employees and CIO checkers and supercheckers. He said it involves no drastic changes in past working conditions, but added he could not announce its provisions until officially signed.

RESOLUTION NO. 223

A RESOLUTION PROVIDING FOR THE CITY OF KLAMATH FALLS TO BECOME A PARTY UNDER THE CHARTER AMENDMENT ACT OF THE STATE OF OREGON, ENABLING SAID CITY TO SHARE AND PARTICIPATE IN THE BENEFITS THEREOF, CREATING A SPECIAL FUND ENTITLED "PUBLIC EMPLOYEES RETIREMENT FUND," IN WHICH MONEY RECEIVED UNDER SAID LEVY SHALL BE PLACED, AMENDING THE CITY CHARTER TO PROVIDE FOR THE CREATING OF SAID FUND, AND DIRECTING THE POLICE JUDGE TO PUBLISH AND POST NOTICES OF SAID ELECTION, DESIGNATING POLLING PLACES AND THE JUDGES AND CLERKS OF SAID ELECTION, THE HOURS OF THE POLLING PLACES, AND APPOINTING FOR SAID ELECTION, REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HERWITH, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

Ordinance No. 381 is entitled as follows:

ORDINANCE NO. 381

AN ORDINANCE CALLING A SPECIAL ELECTION IN THE CITY OF KLAMATH FALLS, OREGON, ON FRIDAY THE 17TH DAY OF MAY, 1946, FOR THE PURPOSE OF SUBMITTING TO THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF SAID CITY OF KLAMATH FALLS, OREGON, ONE CHARTER AMENDMENT AND PROPOSITION PROPOSED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF KLAMATH FALLS, OREGON, AUTHORIZING THE CITY TO PAY PORTIONS OF THE COST OF THE CITY OWNED PARKS WITHIN THE CITY AND PAY THEREFOR AUTHORITY OVER AND ABOVE THE AMOUNT LEVIED FOR EITHER OF A TAX OVER PRECEDING YEARS PLUS SIX PER CENT THEREOF, WHICH CHARTER AMENDMENT AND PROPOSITION IS SUBMITTED UNDER THE LAWS OF OREGON, THE CHARTER OF SAID CITY, AND BY VIRTUE OF ORDINANCE NO. 2022 OF KLAMATH FALLS, OREGON, DULY ENACTED AND PASSED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL ON THE 19TH DAY OF MAY, 1939; AMENDING THE CITY CHARTER TO PROVIDE FOR THE CREATING OF SAID FUND, AND DIRECTING THE POLICE JUDGE TO PUBLISH AND POST NOTICES OF SAID ELECTION, DESIGNATING POLLING PLACES AND THE JUDGES AND CLERKS OF SAID ELECTION, THE HOURS OF THE POLLING PLACES, AND APPOINTING FOR SAID ELECTION, REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HERWITH, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

AN ORDINANCE CALLING A SPECIAL ELECTION IN THE CITY OF KLAMATH FALLS, OREGON, ON FRIDAY THE 17TH DAY OF MAY, 1946, FOR THE PURPOSE OF SUBMITTING TO THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF SAID CITY OF KLAMATH FALLS, OREGON, ONE CHARTER AMENDMENT AND PROPOSITION PROPOSED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF KLAMATH FALLS, OREGON, AUTHORIZING THE CITY TO PAY PORTIONS OF THE COST OF THE CITY OWNED PARKS WITHIN THE CITY AND PAY THEREFOR AUTHORITY OVER AND ABOVE THE AMOUNT LEVIED FOR EITHER OF A TAX OVER PRECEDING YEARS PLUS SIX PER CENT THEREOF, WHICH CHARTER AMENDMENT AND PROPOSITION IS SUBMITTED UNDER THE LAWS OF OREGON, THE CHARTER OF SAID CITY, AND BY VIRTUE OF ORDINANCE NO. 2022 OF KLAMATH FALLS, OREGON, DULY ENACTED AND PASSED BY THE COMMON COUNCIL ON THE 19TH DAY OF MAY, 1939; AMENDING THE CITY CHARTER TO PROVIDE FOR THE CREATING OF SAID FUND, AND DIRECTING THE POLICE JUDGE TO PUBLISH AND POST NOTICES OF SAID ELECTION, DESIGNATING POLLING PLACES AND THE JUDGES AND CLERKS OF SAID ELECTION, THE HOURS OF THE POLLING PLACES, AND APPOINTING FOR SAID ELECTION, REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HERWITH, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.
