

# USRS Takes Over Camp At Tulelake

R. R. Best, project director of WRA Tulelake camp, today turned over all physical properties of the center to E. Laton Stephens, superintendent of the U. S. bureau of reclamation, Klamath Falls.

Guy Booker, formerly office manager of the WRA staff will be acting custodian for the bureau which is taking over the entire property in behalf of the general land office of the department of the interior, the official liquidating agency.

Tulelake center closed as an evacuee center March 20, 1946, when all the Japanese were moved out. The action today puts WRA completely out of business as far as Tulelake is concerned. This is the last of the WRA centers to be liquidated.

The procedure today gave the bureau temporary custodianship of the center until final arrangements have been made. The bulk of the WRA staff left last week with only a few employees left to continue through today. The bureau has a staff of guards and office workers to carry on while it is custodian.

# Joint Arctic Expedition Develops Valuable Data

EDMONTON, Alta., May 4 (CP)—No outstanding difficulty was encountered by the Canadian army's exercise muskox, now rolling down the Alaska highway towards Edmonton on the last lap of its 3100-mile trek across Arctic wastelands which began at Churchill, Man., February 14 and traversed 1500 miles of territory never before travelled by vehicles. Col. J. T. Wilson of Ottawa, deputy director of the expedition, said today.

The expedition is expected to reach here late Sunday or Monday, and Col. Wilson said at a press conference that the group averaged 35 miles a day after leaving Churchill.

"The RCAF has done a number of things never accomplished before," said Col. Wilson. "Never before have large transport aircraft been used as a source of supply in the barren lands."

Wing. Cmdr. Showler said the air supply unit dropped 190 tons of supplies, mostly gasoline, for the ground force. Temperatures have ranged from 36 to 52 degrees below zero.

Lt.-Col. W. A. Wood, assistant United States military attache at Ottawa, said the attitude of the U. S. toward the exercise was one of extreme interest.

**Sen. Lucas Fires Broadside At Lewis**  
WASHINGTON, May 4 (AP)—Senator Lucas (D-Ill.) asserted today the soft coal strike could "easily become an insurrection against the government" and called on President Truman to seize the idle mines unless John L. Lewis "bows to reason."

"Facts and figures should alarm every American, even John L. Lewis, if he is anxious to see his country secure and strong," Lucas declared. "But apparently John L. Lewis has no concern for our national necessity."

**Honolulu Clipper Sets Record Time**
