

Softball Play Starts May 20

Softball play in Klamath Falls will begin Monday, May 27. It was decided at a meeting last night, and 10 and possibly 11 teams are entered in the men's league. Several teams are already practicing and will continue until the season begins.

Teams entered include Knights of Columbus, Palmerton Lumber, Sears, Eagles, Moose, VFW, Ashley Chevrolet, Molitoras, Copeo, Bull Elks and possibly another Elks squad.

Games will be played on Recreation field Monday, Wednesday and Friday nights with a double-header on Sundays. The field is not being used by the hard ball team. Del Moro field may also be used, if permission of the American Legion is granted.

Twilight ball is the only alternative here because there will be no lights this year. All weekday games are scheduled to start at 8:30 p. m. sharp.

A schedule is being drawn up by Harold Hendrickson for the first half of the season whereby each team will play each other teams once. With 11 teams entered, each squad will play 10 games in the first six weeks of the season.

The idea is to split the season into two halves and hold a championship playoff between the top two or four teams at the close of the regular season.

State Rules Adopted
Softball associations were adopted for the local league, including a nine-player lineup (eliminating the short fielder), pitcher's box moved back a foot and bases shortened.

The top regulation stitched Goldsmith ball was adopted for the games. Each team and sponsor are to take care of their own equipment, gloves, bats, practice balls, jerseys, and a \$25 entrance fee is charged each entry.

Each team manager must submit a roster of his players by May 21, a week before the league opens. If a player jumps from one team to another he must register again and a week must elapse after registration before that player can take part in a game.

After a man has played five games with one team he shall not be eligible to play with another team in the regular schedule or in the playoff. New players coming into the league must be registered and a week elapse before they enter a game.

Loop Administration
The managers of each team will form a board of directors for the league and appoint one man to act as administrator of the loop. They will meet Tuesday night, May 20, in the city hall council room for that purpose and also to submit player rosters.

Any team can play any outside games it chooses so long as the outside games do not conflict with the league schedule. Merrill will not be in the league but may play games with league teams.

A 37-passenger bus has been chartered to carry the ball players on the road trips this season and each week about 15 bus seats will be available for spectators who want to go along with the players to see the out-of-town games.

Round-trip bus tickets are on sale at the Klamath Billiards and the money brought in will go to pay part of the cost of chartering the bus.

The bus to Medford will leave the bus terminal about 9 o'clock tomorrow morning.

The Sons open their out-of-town season Sunday, May 12, playing McCloud at McCloud, and the first home game will be played Sunday, May 26, against Redding.

Hurling Outclashes
Stick Work In Major
Loop Tilts Friday

Sam Zoldak, an obscure left-hander from Brooklyn, N. Y., who spent two long years trying to convince Manager Luke Sewell that he could be a big league winner if given the chance, gives promise of establishing himself as the ace of the St. Louis Browns mound staff.

The Polish portlander pitched the Browns into third place in the American league yesterday with a seven-hit 5-1 victory over the Washington Senators.

As good as was Zoldak's work, there were three better pitching performances yesterday in a day when the hurling far outclassed the hitting. No less than three shutouts were turned in, with Allen Gettles probably the most significant. Gettles thwarted the Detroit Tigers with only two hits as the New York Yankees handed the world champions their fifth straight defeat, 2-0.

Trout Loser
The victory came at the expense of Dizzy Trout, an old Yankee nemesis. Little Phil Rizzuto, who earlier in the day turned down a \$100,000 Mexican league offer, singled in the first Yankee run and Charlie Keller's home run accounted for the second.

Johnny Schmitz, Chicago Cubs' left-hander, was credited with a 1-0 shutout over the New York Giants but a fine relief job by Hi Bithorn made it possible. Schmitz was driven from the mound in the ninth inning when the Giants loaded the bases with one out, but Bithorn stepped up to the hill and fanned the next two batters to save the game.

Al Jurisich, Philadelphia Phils' right-hander, purchased from the St. Louis Cardinals last winter, blanked the Cincinnati Reds, 1-0.

Mickey Harris, undefeated left-hander, gained his fourth triumph as the American league leading Boston Red Sox stretched their winning streak to eight consecutive games by outscoring Cleveland, 9-4. Ted Williams and Rudy York each hit their third homers for the Sox.

Beats John Sain
Ken Heintzelman southpawed his way to his third triumph of the season and hung the first defeat on Johnny Sain as Pittsburgh shaded the Boston Braves, 3-2. Heintzelman gave up five hits while the Pirates garnered six.

The Chicago White Sox overcame a four-run deficit in the sixth inning to defeat the Philadelphia Athletics, 8-5. Murrell Jones hammered a three-run homer in the seventh to provide the Sox with the margin of victory.

Pair Of Five-Round Bouts Lead Tuesday Fight Card

The card for the boxing matches at the armory Tuesday night will be just the same as it was before the fights were postponed for a week. Matchmaker Larry McLane has announced. The docket calls for two five-round fights and three four-round bouts.

In the top weight struggle, five frames, Chuck Kujawski, city fireman and army veteran, will tangle with LeRoy Barkley of Chilquin. That fight is in the 170-pound lightweight bracket.

The other five-round battle will be between a pair of middleweights, tipping the scales at 152. Bob Ross and Bruce Miller are the fighters.

Lloyd "Blackie" Smith, 145, meets Daily Lotches of Chilquin, 148, in one of the four-round bouts. Another pits Rudy Carlson against Chilquin's Jack Jones at 145 pounds.

Teddy Roosevelt, local colored boxer, tangles with Johnny Ruff of Chilquin in the 155-pound weight division for the other four-round bout.

These fights, the first public boxing in Klamath Falls for 18 months—since the marines and sailors were staging their smoker bouts—will be conducted according to stringent state boxing commission rules.

Tickets for reserved seats are on sale now at Matt Finnigan's sporting goods store and general admission ducats will be available at the armory box office Tuesday night.
