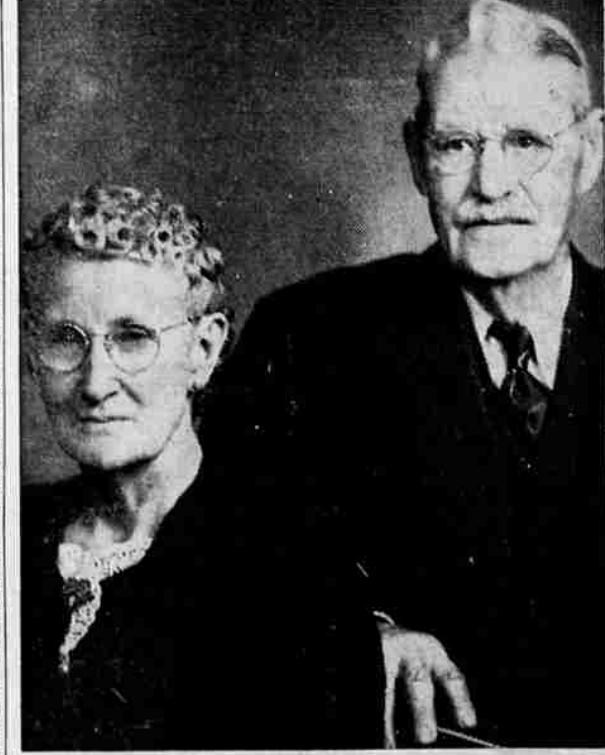
Annual AAUW Tea Set For May 11

Holland Letter

An interesting letter has been received by Alice M. Waldron of the Klamath county library staff, from Dr. Magrita J. Freie of Amsterdam, Holland, thanking her for a parcel which was prepared by the AAUW chapter at Park College, Parkville, Mo., to which Miss Waldron belonged. The letter said, in part:

"The useful parcel you sent to Holland for me was a great surprise. It contained just the things we are so badly in need of, as underwear, yarn, leather, combs, hairpins, a woolen wrap and even haberdashery. Thank you very much. How did you know so well what we wanted?"

"Moreover it is the sympathy you show us with this gift which we value so high. And we are so hungry for sympathy. Life is still very hard here though nowadays we have enough food. In Amsterdam we were nearly starved to death as the liberators came. They were just in time, God bless them."

"But textiles are lacking and so life is still very complicated. I am the director of a large lyceum for girls, corresponding to a junior college in America, and with so many girls as the background, one would like to be in the situation of giving and giving."

"I hope I shall have the pleasure of meeting you one day in America. In 1931, I represented Holland at the council meeting at Wellesley college of the IFUW. I stayed several months in America and was very happy there. Since that time I have the intention of visiting your happy and beautiful country again."
