Expert Workers Needed To Assist Child Court

(This is the third and last of a series on juvenile court matters prepared by the League of Women Voters.)

The basic philosophy contained in the juvenile law of Oregon is sound from the standpoint of protection. Its failures are largely in setting up good methods of treatment after court adjudication. The juvenile court procedure has emerged from one "of criminal prosecution" to one "of social treatment." However, the law has failed to realize that "social treatment" is a specialized field and is most effectively done by persons trained in that field.

The courts at present have to utilize their probation workers whose chief function is investigation, court presentation and, if given, is highly problematical whether one individual can be effective in all these functions. Many probation workers realize that their identification with the police aspects of the job is a handicap when it comes to treatment. An increasingly popular point of view is that trained child welfare workers of the county welfare department are well equipped to work with children on probation. These workers are available to most counties in Oregon. Specific legislation along this line may be considered in the coming session of the legislature.

State institutions for the care of delinquents are woefully inadequate at the present, placing a severe handicap on the judges of the several counties. Although \$6,000,000 was appropriated at the last legislature for enlarging the facilities, nothing has been done as yet.

The state maintains a training school for boys, the Hillcrest school for girls (including women to the age of 25), and the Fairview home for feeble-minded girls and women. These institutions are all administered and supervised by the state board of control consisting of the governor, the secretary of state and the state treasurer. The law makes no provision for personnel standards for the superintendent or other staff employed to operate these institutions. A 1945 law provides for the appointment of an advisory committee to study the policy and administration and make recommendations in the interest of the institution.
