

Lake Yields Corpse Of Bruno Wife

MILAN, May 6 (AP)—The body of Bruno Mussolini's widow was recovered yesterday from Lake Como, where she drowned the previous night during a boating party with three British soldiers and another woman. Identification was confirmed by documents in the clothing.

Police said the attractive, 30-year-old daughter-in-law of the former duce drowned when the boat sprang a leak and sank in a deep section of the lake. Two members of the party were rescued by fishermen, but a British army captain and an enlisted man were missing.

Bruno Mussolini, whose widow has been living in Como for the past two years, was killed in 1941 while testing a bomber.

His widow, the former Signora Clara Ruberti, was the daughter of Prof. Guido Ruberti, a theater critic and head of the education ministry's division of contemporary art during Mussolini's regime. Members of her family were known as ardent fascists.

Army Seeks Lost Plane

HELENA, Mont., May 6 (AP)—An army C-45 plane with six men aboard was missing and presumed down on a flight from Billings, Mont., to Spokane, Wash., today and army planes were scheduled to begin a search of western Montana and eastern Washington.

Seven men were on the plane when it left Billings, but one of them, Sgt. Frank Avry of Youngstown, O., bailed out near Wilsall, Mont., when he thought the plane was in danger of going down. Avry said it levelled off and flew on after he jumped.

Four planes of the 66th air force search and rescue service under command of Capt. B. Jack Klingler were scheduled to take off from Great Falls for an aerial search of the rugged terrain. Other planes from the Ogden, Utah, army air base were to join the search.

The plane left Billings at 11:54 a. m. (MST) yesterday and was due at Spokane at 2:45 p. m. (PST). Col. H. W. Ferguson, duty officer at the Spokane army air field, said the plane had four hours fuel.

Prominent Engineer Dies At Salem Home

SALEM, May 6 (AP)—C. B. McCullough, 58, assistant state highway engineer and one of America's best known bridge engineers, died of a heart attack at his home here today.

McCullough, who also was chairman of Salem's long-range planning commission, has had heart trouble for the past few years.

His fame spread over the entire continent, his greatest work being supervisor of bridge construction on the inter-American highway in Central America, and construction of the five beautiful bridges on the Oregon coast highway.

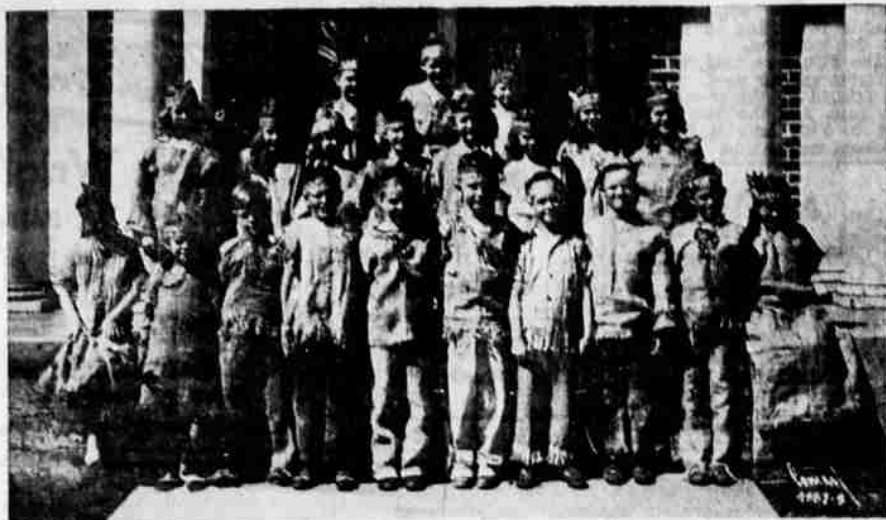
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Third Graders Play Indian In Pioneer Program

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Higher Duties Asked On Flax

PORTLAND, May 6 (AP)—An appeal for higher import duties on flax fiber to protect 2000 Oregon growers against further losses they face because of claims European nations are dumping war hoarded fiber, has been made here by a spokesman for the industry.

Alfred Lentschner, manager of the Santiam Flax Growers cooperative, reported prices have already tumbled from 58 cents a pound to 40 cents because of dumping by Belgian and Dutch growers.

Lentschner said the government encouraged Oregon to expand its acreage during the war and because of the need, growers jumped production from 1200 tons in 1940 to 2700 tons in 1945 and processed 73 per cent of the essential war needs for the fiber.

Three of the state's 13 flax plants have already shut down, he said, and others face closure.



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
