

Local Juvenile Court Lauded

The Klamath county juvenile court and office were highly praised in a telegram from Claire A. Argow, executive secretary of the Oregon Prison association, received by Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg this morning.

Mrs. Argow inspected the juvenile setup here last Saturday, visiting the juvenile cottage, county health unit and detention home.

She is making a tour of the state inspecting juvenile offices and courts in every county and told officials here that the Klamath county facilities were among the best in the state.

In her telegram Mrs. Argow said that she was "sincerely impressed with the program of keeping young offenders out of jail and providing suitable detention facilities in the juvenile cottage and county health unit."

"Was also pleased to note the real concern for the children's welfare shown by all members of your staff," the wire continued.

Mrs. Argow also expressed approval of the arrangement whereby the juvenile office has both a man and a woman officer to handle juveniles.

Reds Refuse To Leave Bulgaria

PARIS, May 7 (AP)—American sources said today that V. M. Molotov, Russian foreign minister, had refused to withdraw Soviet troops from Bulgaria on the ground they were needed there to protect communication lines into the Russian zone of Austria.

Ernest Bevin, British foreign secretary, asserted that if the foreign ministers adopted an American proposal for adding an Austrian settlement to the conference agenda, red army troops would not be needed to safeguard the communication lines.

Bowles Opposes Rail Rate Rise

WASHINGTON, May 7 (AP)—Economic Stabilizer Chester Bowles said today substantial increase in transportation costs at this time would "seriously jeopardize the stability of the nation's economy."

Testifying at the interstate commerce commission's hearing on the railroad's petition to increase freight rates 25 per cent on May 15, Bowles said: "Transportation costs touch every phase of production and distribution and add to costs at every level. Increases in freight rates will in many instances require increases in price ceilings."

ICC Slates Hearing On OCN Stage Sale

ALTURAS, May 7—A hearing on the sale of the OCN stages to the Greyhound Stage Line, will be held before the interstate commerce commission in Reno, May 15.

It is approved by the commission and accepted by California railroad commission, Nevada public service commission and the Oregon public utilities commission, it is expected the Greyhound people will take over the NCO immediately.

The route covered runs from Reno, through Susanville, Alturas and to Klamath Falls.

Frank Word of Alturas is president and general manager of the OCN stage line.

Soldiers Save Baby In Window Tumble

BALTIMORE, May 7 (AP)—Two unidentified soldiers were credited today with catching a 16-month-old baby after he fell from his bedroom window, 30 feet above the stone pavement. The baby escaped without a scratch.

Eugene Shipley, sweeping the pavement two houses away, said two soldiers came to him with the baby, told him they were passing by, had caught the baby as he fell, handed the boy to him and asked him to return him to his mother. They then walked away.

Prisoner Beater Indicted By Jury

PORTLAND, May 7 (AP)—The Multnomah county grand jury today indicted Robert Frederick Dillon, 32-year-old deputy sheriff, on an assault and battery charge, accusing him of beating the handcuffed slayer of another deputy.

The grand jury's special report said Dillon "used excessive force and violence" toward John E. Drew, 25, after he had surrendered to a posse and been handcuffed.

Grain Dealers Ask Anderson's Intent

SEATTLE, May 7 (AP)—Indignant over what speakers termed "deliberate governmental bungling," 250 members of the Pacific Northwest Feed association recessed their convention for two hours today to contact Secretary of Agriculture Anderson for a commitment on what he intends to do about the critical wheat feed shortage.

NO SENATE CLOTURE

WASHINGTON, May 7 (AP)—The senate today rejected a move to limit further debate on the \$3,750,000,000 British loan legislation by refusing to apply the rarely used cloture rule.
