Local Sailor Sees Jap Subs Go Down

Calvin E. Worley S 1/c (RM), son of Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Allen, route 3, Stewart addition, was transferred to the USS Goodrich two months ago from the USS Yosemite.

He was aboard the Goodrich April 2 when the navy sank 24 Japanese submarines with demolition and gunfire. One of these subs sank the cruiser Indianapolis just before V-J Day. The subs deemed unfit for salvage sank in 900 feet of water off the once-great naval base of Sasebo.

Worley enlisted in the U. S. navy in January 1945 and was sent overseas in October 1945. He expects to be separated from the service sometime in July.
