Inaugural Fight Card Set For Armory Arena Tonight

Tonight is the night for the first prize fights to be held in Klamath Falls for 18 months, since the days when the marines and sailors put on a smoker or two for war bond drives early last year.

The curtain goes up at 8:30 in the armory on five welter, middle and lightweight bouts between Klamath Falls and Chiloquin boys, inaugurating a semi-monthly boxing card here.

In the future Promoter Mack Lillard and Matchmaker Larry McLane plan to have bouts every other Tuesday night, in addition to the weekly wrestling matches on Thursday night.

Tonight's two main event fights puts Bruce Miller of Chiloquin against Bob Ross of Klamath, five rounds at 152 pounds, and Chuck Kujawski of Klamath against LeRoy Barkley of Chiloquin at 170.

Teddy Roosevelt meets Chiloquin's Johnny Ruff in a four-

round prelim at 155 pounds. Another four-rounder pits Rudy Carlson and Jack Jones together at 140 pounds, and the other bout places Blackie Smith of Klamath and Dally Lotches of Chiloquin in the ring at 148 pounds.

Eight-ounce gloves will be used in the bouts, which will be conducted according to strict state boxing commission rules. The referee and two judges will officiate and make decisions.

PCL Shakeup Drags Bevos Into Cellar

The Pacific Coast baseball league clubs had one of their greatest personnel shakeups this season, and as a result the two teams which dominated the wind-up last year are the low men on the ladder today.

Defending the pennant, the Portland Beavers, who got less out of the re-shuffle than most of the rest of the clubs, have been dragged into the cellar with 22 losses in 36 starts.

Just ahead of them with the same number of losses and 15 wins are the Seattle Rainiers, who finished second last year.

The league has developed into a much better pitchers' loop than during the war years, and the two northern teams can blame much of their trouble on failure to keep the pace in that department.

In power at the plate, the Rainiers have kept up, and today have a team batting average second only to Hollywood. Headliners for the Rainiers include Harold Sueme, with an average of .370 in 19 games up to Friday; Bill Ramsey, with .349 in 34 games, and Ted Norbert, with .317 in 16.

The Beavers stand sixth in team batting average, with the best individual performance so far turned in by Herman Reich, hitting .315 in 29 games.

McPhail Going To Legal Mat With Pasquel

NEW YORK, May 7 (AP)—The hearing on the application of President Larry McPhail of the New York Yankees for an injunction restraining Jorge Pasquel and his Mexican baseball league from attempting to induce Yankee players to go to Mexico was postponed today until May 16 at the request of Jerome Hess, attorney for Pasquel.

Justice Julius Miller granted the postponement over the protest of Louis Carroll, attorney representing the Yankees who said the club would be on the road at that time. Hess said his client needed more time to prepare for the proceedings.

In St. Louis, Federal Judge Rubey M. Hulen issued a temporary restraining order enjoining the Pasquel organization from "unlawfully interfering" with the Brooklyn Dodgers and set May 14 for hearing on a request for a permanent injunction filed for the club by a St. Louis attorney.

Bend Tops Pel Track

The Bend Lava Bears topped Klamath's Pelicans in a dual track and field meet in the Deschutes city Saturday but had to wait until the final event, the relay, to do it.

Final tally was 64 1/2 points for Bend to 57 1/2 for Klamath. At the end of the last event before the relay each team needed the relay to win but Klamath's top point-winners in that event were not along, having gone to the state music festival or been left at home with injuries.

Bend copped the relay and the meet.

George Rasmussen, Bend's ace pole vaulter again cracked the state vault record, hitting 12 feet 10 1/2 inches, an inch and a half above the mark he had set the week before at Salem.

Elwyn Rose of Klamath hurled the javelin 158 feet 3 1/2 inches, setting a new field record, and Bill Sari heaved the shot 43 feet 11 1/2 inches for a new field mark.

Famous Boxing Manager Dead

NEW YORK, May 7 (AP)—James J. Johnston, manager, known throughout the boxing world, died suddenly today at his home of a heart attack. He was 70.

Johnston, father of 12 children, attended the fights in St. Nick's last night and a little later complained to companions that "I'm tired. Take me home so I can get a good night's sleep."

He arose this morning and collapsed while dressing.

During his career he managed or was interested in the affairs of nine world champions, including Jack Sharkey of Boston who held the world heavyweight crown for a time.

Others on his list of champions were Harry Greb, Ted (Kid) Lewis, Vince Dundee, Pete Latzo and Mike McTigue.

Tacoma Opens New Ball Field

Tacoma, last of the eight clubs in the Western International League to play before the home folks, will trot out the parades and the bunting and a two-ton baseball bat this afternoon and unveil a new ball park as well.

Bremerton provides the opposition, repaying the compliment, as it were. The Tacoma Tigers opened Bremerton's home season in that town's first professional baseball game.

The new Tacoma park seats around 5000, so an opening game attendance record for this season may be in the books. Salem's 4309 seems to be tops to date.

The two-ton, 40-foot bat is a donation from a pole company but none of the Tiger Paul Bunyans is expected to do anything with the bat except gawk at it.

Main W-I interest tonight, however, will center at Wenatchee where the phenomenal Salem Senators seek to tie Yakima's 1938 mark of 12 straight victories at the opening of a season. The Senators, managed by ex-Umpire Frisco Edwards, already have racked eleven straight—four from Yakima and seven from Spokane. Wenatchee currently is in second place.

Victoria opens a full week's stand at Yakima tonight, while Vancouver starts a three-game series at Spokane. Starting Friday, the clubs switch foes, with Vancouver at Tacoma; Bremerton at Wenatchee and Salem at Spokane for weekend four-game series while Victoria and Yakima stay put.

No Housing, No Coaching

SANTA CLARA, Calif., May 7 (AP)—The housing shortage cost Santa Clara university its football coach today — Larry (Moon) Mullins, celebrated half-back of Knute Rockne days.

Mullins, in submitting his resignation, which was accepted by the athletic board, explained he had spent the past five months trying to find living quarters for his wife and six children.

Mullins told newsmen that during that time his wife and four daughters had lived in a hotel in nearby San Jose, while he and his two sons lived at the university.

He said he had no immediate plans for a new coaching job, and intimated he would make sure of living accommodations beforehand in considering a new offer.

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Bosox Winging Away On 11-Game Streak

Joe Cronin's critics must be hard up for ammunition today with the Boston Red Sox winging away to an 11-game winning streak and topping the American league by three lengths.

Cronin's gang is the hottest thing in baseball this springtime season with the slugger beating out a .316 team average during the victory spree and 10 of 11 straight pitchers going the route.

Tex Hughson, Dave Ferriss and Micky Harris were supposed to carry the pitching load but an ex-GI named Joe Dobson, generally overlooked in the early calculations, has been taking the bows with Harris on a perfect 4-0 win record.

It was Dobson who handed Hal Newhouser his first loss of the season last week and it was the same 29-year-old righthander from Durant, Okla., who kept the win streak alive by winning yesterday's 5-4 second game from St. Louis after Ferriss had taken the opener, 7-5.

Leftfielder Ted Williams has been living up to all expectations with a .411 mark (.481 during the win streak), and Shortstop Johnny Pesky leads the league with a gaudy .430. Center Fielder Donnie Dickmaggio and Catcher Hal Wagner add their slugging to give Boston the first four hitters in the circuit.

The 11-game string is the longest since 1939 when Cronin's gang reeled off 12 in a row.

Boston gained a full game and a half on the New York Yankees who fell before Chicago's Thornton Lee, 2-1. Lee, a 38-year-old left-hander, came up with his first decision of the year on an eight-hit effort against Floyd Bevin, winning his own game with a two-run single.
