

# Army Reveals Wartime Survey For Railhead At Bering Strait Port

SEATTLE, May 8 (AP)—A wartime survey for a railway line between Prince George, B. C., and Teller, Alaska, which would make possible shipments to a port within sight of the Russian-Siberian coastline across the Bering strait, was disclosed yesterday by the Seattle district U. S. army engineers.

The report said "this entire transaction and delivery was guarded with the greatest secrecy since Russia was not at war with Japan and Russian vessels had to pass through Japanese waters to make delivery at a time when Russia was holding Germany in eastern Europe with great difficulty."

# AFL To Merge Marine Unions

SEATTLE, May 8 (AP)—Officials of the International Longshoremen's association reported yesterday at the close of their annual convention a merger of all maritime unions within the AFL to balance the merging of CIO marine units has been started.

Previously, reports have been made on the survey of the 1440 miles between Prince George and Fairbanks, Alaska, but the engineers said this was the first announcement on the 730-mile survey from Fairbanks to Teller.

Plans for the railway proposed construction of a large port at Teller for the transshipment of goods across the strait to an extension of the trans-Siberian railway.

Between October 31, 1942, and March 31, 1943, Col. James Truitt, now with the engineering staff of eighth army headquarters in Japan, conducted the survey in bitter winter weather.

# FM Program Inaugurated

PORTLAND, May 8 (AP)—Frequency modulation broadcasting was inaugurated in the north west by station KGWFM, Portland, late yesterday afternoon, less than an hour after the FCC granted permission.

The first FM program, a news broadcast followed by a musical program, was heard by several of the less than a dozen FM receiving sets in the city. There was no previous announcement of the initial broadcast, made at 5:45 p. m.

H. Quenton Cox, station manager, predicted within a few years listeners will "hear nothing but frequency modulation" programs.

J. K. Cheadle, Spokane, reported to the Pacific Northwest Development association that those favoring the CVA plan "give the public little information on what is inside the 70-page bill proposed by Senator Mitchell (D-Wash.)." He asserted the bill would "establish a public corporation in private business," operating virtually free of congress.

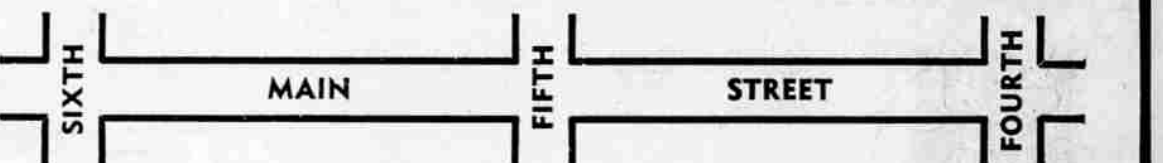

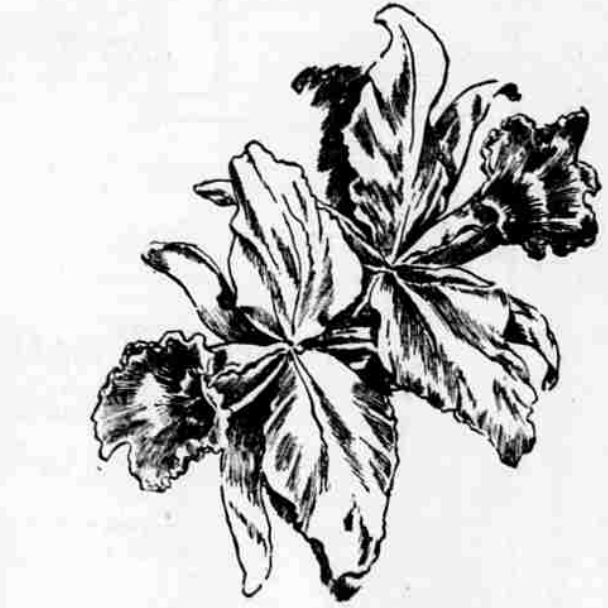
