

Kohns Open Flower Shop

The grand opening Wednesday of Kohn's Flower Shop, 430 Main, marked another step toward bringing the Klamath Falls business section up to the last minute in pleasurable shopping convenience.

The old office formerly occupied by the OPA has been transformed by Mr. and Mrs. Matt Kohn, proprietors of the new business, at a cost of \$10,000, into a modern fairyland of flowers, indirect lighting and pastel walls.

Curved glass windows flank the glass entrance door which is framed in glass brick. Each window encloses a bower of flowers reflected in large wall mirrors.

Huge mirrors on opposite walls lend a spacious effect to the shop, doubling the glass tables, cases and shelves artistically placed, which hold breath-taking flower arrangements. A large glass refrigerator case displaying perishable plants and blossoms divides the front of the shop from the large light workroom in the rear.

Kohn, a resident of this city for 25 years, now lives at 534 N. 6th. His wife assists him in the flower shop and his two daughters, Beverly, 14, and Lynette, eight, attend Fremont Junior high and grade schools.

Wallace Jahn, a florist for many years, has come from the east coast to take a position in the new shop, and Florence Tetzloff and Mrs. Annie Boothby complete the present staff.

This business is a new venture for Kohn who was employed with Ewauna Box company for 15 years and also in the car painting business. Both he and Mrs. Kohn have worked with Tommy Luke, Portland florist, to learn the "ropes."

Work of remodeling the building was started the latter part of March and completed Tuesday evening. The Kohns worked most of the night cleaning up after the workmen and arranging the plants so they could open on schedule at 10 a. m. Wednesday.

Teen-Age AWOL Newlywed Held In Fort Lawton Brig

SEATTLE, May 9 (AP)—On his own statement that he is AWOL from Buckley field, Denver, a teen-aged bridegroom was held behind bars in the Fort Lawton guardhouse here last night—and his 15-year-old bride awaited his requested army release—outside.

Harry James Slyter told reporters at the fort that he had come to Seattle from Denver without leave to get his birth certificate and thereby prove he was too young to be a soldier. He said he was only 14 years old and he wanted to get out of the army and support his youthful bride, 15, whom he married in Denver April 19.

The pretty bride, who was Patsy Ann Herbert, said she and Harry hitch-hiked here about 10 days ago. She said her mother was Mrs. Bertha Herbert of Denver, and that both she and her mother had believed Harry was 18 at the time of the marriage.

Harry said he enlisted in the army at Ketchikan, Alaska, last October, giving his age as 18, and that he again said he was 18 when he obtained the approval of Juvenile Judge Gillian of Denver for the marriage. Actually, said young Slyter, he won't be 15 until June 6.

He is the son of Mrs. Marion Burton, blind Seattle street accordionist.

Patsy Ann said Harry's age made no difference to her and that both hoped he could get out of the army, find a civilian job and establish a home.

The provost marshal at Fort Lawton is awaiting an answer to a wire asking Buckley field whether they wish the lad returned there.

The couple were married in Denver while Slyter was stationed there as an "acting sergeant" in charge of a barracks detail of 39 men.

Seamen Get War Bonus

SEATTLE, May 9 (AP)—The American mail line will pay a war zone bonus amounting to \$250,000 to 40 crew members of the freighter Capillo who went through three years of internment after the ship was sunk by Jap bombs in Manila harbor early in the war.

Attorney John Ambler, company representative of the company who made the announcement, said a test case was carried through federal district court here and the circuit court of appeals in San Francisco. He

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said the latter court decided a special rider on the ship's articles provided for full payment of regular war zone voyage bonus through the years of internment.

All the crew members survived the bombing, but three died in the camp before their liberation.
