

Oregon's Johnny Pesky Best Short In Majors

In a year when the major leagues boast the greatest array of shortstops in the history of baseball, the Boston Red Sox' Johnny Pesky stands out today as probably the finest of them all.

The five-foot-nine-inch lad who only a few years ago was clubhouse boy out in his native Portland, Ore., and who only last Monday was stopped one hit short of tying the major league record of 12 consecutive hits, led another standard yesterday when he tallied six times in a 14-10 slugfest, won by Boston

over Jimmy Dykes' Chicago White Sox.
Pesky erased the former American league high mark of five held by Lou Gehrig and Jimmy Foxx among others and joined Mel Ott of the New York Giants as the only modern to accomplish this feat. Guy Hecker holds the all-time high of seven made in 1886 with Louisville of the American association.

419 Plate Average
Including the four hits in yesterday's game, Pesky has garnered 39 in 91 times at bat for a .419 average to lead both leagues in batting. He also has

scored the most runs—30. In his first year in the big leagues—1942—before he joined the navy for a three-year hitch, the 26-year-old shortstop led the circuit in hits on a .331 batting mark.
With Ted Williams, Rudy York and Bobby Doerr joining Pesky in the Boston hit parade, the American league leaders slammed four Chicago pitchers for 17 safeties to set a new club record of 13 consecutive victories, topping their 1939 skunk by one.

Southpaw Mickey Harris was hit hard, but had his fifth

straight victory saved for him by Dave (Boo) Ferriss, who came to his assistance in the ninth inning.
Chandler Wins Fifth
The New York Yankees remained three and a half lengths behind the Red Sox when they triumphed over the St. Louis Browns 5-1. Spud Chandler, the major's only five game winners by holding the Cincinnati Reds and the Brooklyn Dodgers to three hits, two of which came in the ninth when the Browns scored their one run.
Detroit's Hal Newhouse and Cleveland's Bobby Feller, who

with Chandler and Boston's Tex Hughson, are expected to fight it out for the league's pitching leadership, each hurled a masterful game with Newhouse blanking the Washington Senators, 1-0, and Feller whipping the Philadelphia Athletics, 5-2.
Don Padgett's pinch-hit home run in the 10th inning gave the Brooklyn Dodgers an 8-5 victory over the Cincinnati Reds and kept the Brooks a half game behind the National league leading St. Louis Cardinals.
Giants Advance
With Dave Koslo besting Pittsburgh's Fritz Ostermueller

in an all-lefty pitching duel, the New York Giants advanced into a fifth place tie with the Pirates by shelling the Bucs, 1-0.
Phil Cavaretta, Lou Stringer and Ed Waitkus, led a 14-hit attack with three hits apiece as the Chicago Cubs trampled the Boston Braves, 10-5, to move into third place in the National league.
The St. Louis Cardinals protected their first place lead with a 5-3 triumph over Philadelphia's Phils in a night contest.

Angels Sweep Twin Bill From Bevos, 4-2 And 3-1

The weakness which has kept the Portland Beavers in or near the cellar position of the Pacific Coast Baseball league may well hoist the Los Angeles Angels into first position this week.
The Angels opened their series of the week with the Beavers yesterday by sweeping a doubleheader, 4-2 and 3-1, to move within a game and a half of the first place San Francisco Seals who dropped a 1-0 decision to Sacramento.

The Seattle Rainiers unlimbered their usually dormant bats against Oakland for a 13-9 win that left the third place Oaks a game and a half behind Los Angeles. The Hollywood Stars moved to within one percentage point of fourth-place San Diego as they blanked the Padres, 8-0.

Angel Chuckers Yank Terry and Cliff Chambers both narrowly missed shutout wins over Portland in the doubleheader at Los Angeles. Terry held the Beavers scoreless for eight innings in the 4-2 opener, but weakened in the ninth to grant a double and two singles. A wild throw by Angel Catcher Dewey Williams helped the Beavers tallying.

Bevos' Run Uneared
Portland's run in the 3-1 nightcap was uneared, robbing Chambers of a shutout. Portland Manager Marv Owen got aboard on Wimpy Quinn's two-bagger, bobbled and scored on Frank Shone's single in the fifth.

Oakland out-hit the Rainiers, 17 to 14, but the northerners bunched their safeties more effectively for the 13-9 win. The Rainiers scored five times in the first two innings and were never headed, although the Oaks had the bases loaded and the tying run at bat in the eighth. A right field fly ended the threat.

Tony Freitas pitched and batted the Sacramento Solons to their 1-0 win over San Francisco. He yielded only five hits and doubled into left field in the second inning, bringing in Gene Lillard who had walked. San Francisco's Al Lien allowed only four safeties.

Another five-hit pitching performance netted the Hollywood team its 8-0 win over San Diego. Xavier Rescigno limited the Padres to the quintuple safeties while his mates clinched the game with a single tally in the opening frame and added seven more in the seventh and eighth innings off 11 hits.

The big fish went on display yesterday in Spokane, frozen in a 300-pound cake of ice.

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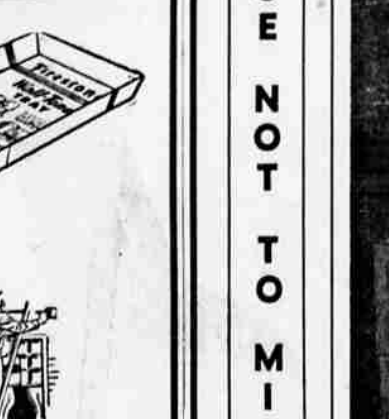
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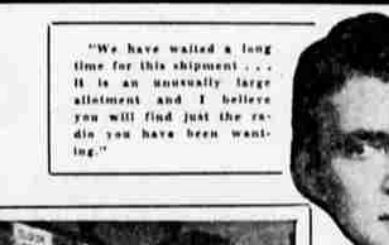
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
