

Loan Debate Still Rages In Senate

WASHINGTON, May 9 (AP)—The senate refused 54 to 27 today to lay aside the proposed \$3,750,000,000 British loan until the house had considered it.

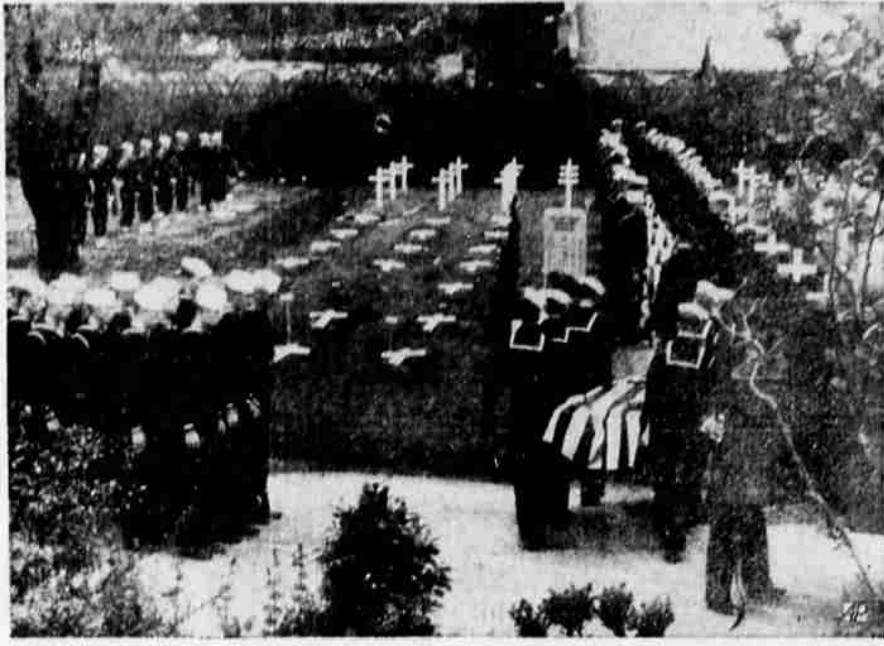
The vote came on a point of order raised by Senator Edwin C. Johnson (D-Colo.) who contended the loan bill is a revenue-raising measure on which the constitution requires house action first.

However, Democratic Leader Barkley of Kentucky, faced immediately a new hurdle in his attempt to obtain senate approval of the loan before nightfall.

Senator Eastland (D-Miss.) said he would move, with what he called "strong support," to put aside the bill and take up labor control legislation.

Barkley promised to fight any such move. He said labor measures also must await senate action on a proposal to extend the draft act.

Siamese Twins May Be Named

PORTLAND, Ore., May 9 (AP)—The names of Siamese twins born here to Mr. and Mrs. Edward Hulse may be given today if the mother can make her choice for the two blonde girls, the Portland General hospital reported.

Meanwhile the twins, joined near the base of the spine in a manner that the attending physician said may prevent the girls walking upright if they survive, were taking nourishment normally.

They will be three days old at 3 p. m. today.

Dr. Joseph V. Springer, who made the delivery, reported the 28-year-old mother was expecting twins, but until delivery neither had any intimation of unusual circumstances.

He reported each child has a separate spinal cord, but they are fused firmly at the lower ends in such way that until X-ray pictures were examined it was not certain which set of legs belonged to which twin. Their heads are at almost opposite ends along a line, Dr. Springer said.

Oregon Building Approved By CPA

PORTLAND, May 9 (AP)—Construction of \$615,000 worth of buildings in Oregon had approval of the civilian production administration officer here today, while \$915,616 in plans were rejected.

Approved were: Grants Pass, \$51,000 and Corvallis, \$51,000 for expansion of branch banks of United States National Bank of Portland; Newberg, \$30,000 for processing plant, Oregon Nut Growers, Inc.; Ashland \$18,500 and Coquille, \$21,000 for altering branch banks of First National Bank of Portland.

Baker Coal Supply Not Critical Yet

BAKER, Ore., May 9 (AP)—The supply of coal in Baker is not far below average for this time of year, leading supply dealers indicated today. The principal dealers have insufficient coal to fill bins for next winter and unless the strike is ended soon the situation will become very critical, they said.

Most of Baker's homes are heated with coal. None of the large payroll industries depend upon coal. Only local institution which may be affected is the hospital, one dealer said.
