

4-H Summer Session To Draw 1400 Youths

Oregon's 1946 4-H club summer school, to be held at Oregon State college June 18 to 28, will be somewhat larger than a year ago but still will be limited to about 1400 boys and girls, according to H. C. Seymour, state 4-H club leader.

This will compare with about 1100 who attended last year's school and a peak pre-war enrollment of around 2200. Housing facilities have improved slightly this year to permit a small increase in numbers.

This year's session will be the 31st for Oregon club youngsters. Started in 1914, these schools have been held every year since except 1944 when army students stationed on the campus occupied practically all available housing.

The Oregon club school is unique among all those held in the United States, being the only one that extends for as long as 10 days and likewise having the largest attendance of club boys and girls of any similar school in the nation in normal years.

County quotas have been established again this year on the basis of the ratio of club members completing their projects. Members winning school scholarships in state and county competition will be given first preference and scholarship winners in community contests will be considered next, Seymour says. Any vacancies remaining in county quotas may be filled by those paying their own way.

Supplementing the staff of several score regular OSC faculty members who will instruct the youngsters in classrooms and laboratories will be a number of nationally-known specialists, according to Seymour. These will include L. M. Vaughn, chief of the labor utilization division of the federal extension service; Kenneth Ingwaolson, western states field representative for the extension service; T. A. Erickson, formerly state 4-H leader in Minnesota for many years; and several representatives of national firms interested in club work.

Prompt Action On Vet Loans

Prompt action on applications for farm construction under the new veterans' emergency housing program is assured Oregon farmers by E. Harvey Miller, state director of the USDA production and marketing administration.

To make more materials available for veterans' housing, limitations have been placed on the amount of other types of construction that can be performed without approval. The limits on farm construction are:

1. \$400 for a farm dwelling.
2. \$1000 for other farm buildings.
3. \$8000 to replace a farm house or other building destroyed by fire, flood or other disaster, if reconstruction is started within 60 days of the date of the disaster.

For construction costing more than these limitations, farmers will file an application with their county AAA committee, Miller said. County committees will review applications, add their recommendation, and forward them to the state committee in Portland for final action. The state committee will notify applicants of approval or denial. Miller pointed out, however, that only applications for farm dwellings can be considered for such III preference ratings. Only permission to begin construction can be given to applications for other farm buildings. He added that sawmills are required to set aside 40 per cent of their output for construction jobs carrying III ratings, and that the other 60 per cent presumably is available for non-rated projects.

In acting on applications for farm construction, AAA committees will give consideration to the following standards of essentiality:

1. The proposed construction is essential to maintain or increase food production on the farm.
2. The proposed construction is desirable from the standpoint of 1946 production goals.
3. Present facilities are being utilized to maximum capacity, and the proposed facilities will be fully utilized.

Northwest Grain Shipped For UNRRA

WASHINGTON, May 9 (AP)—The department of agriculture notified Senator Mitchell (D-Wash) today 61,265 long tons of wheat were shipped from Puget sound and Columbia river ports in Washington and Oregon for UNRRA in January and February.

From Portland, Ore., and Vancouver and Longview, Wash., shipments totaled 53,249 and from Seattle and Tacoma, 8016 long tons.

A total of 6187 long tons of sugar were shipped from Crocker, et al, Calif. Other foods shipped from the San Francisco bay area totaled 23,975 tons, and from Portland 2956 tons. In the two

months, 5212 tons left Seattle and 1091 tons left Tacoma.

How to prepare for a festive Mother's Day

Surprise Mother by letting her be guest of honor for at least one festive meal on Mother's Day. Make it the kind of a meal that Dad and the youngsters can prepare without her help, but include the pretty touches to give it a party feeling.

DRESS UP THE TABLE—Choose Mother's favorite pastel color, and make placemats with ruffled edges from crepe paper. It's just a matter of cutting and stretching the edges. For the centerpiece, cover a large box with crepe paper, May-basket style, ruffle the edges, and fill with flowers or trailing ivy. At Mother's place, have a smaller May basket filled with her gifts or a variety of her favorite cosmetics.

FOR BREAKFAST OR BRUNCH—Start off with chilled tomato juice that's been pepped up with a bit of lemon juice... about 1/2 tsp. of lemon juice for each glass of tomato juice. Garnish with a sprig of parsley or a celery leaf.

Easy Scrambled Eggs have a party air, and are easy to fix. Beat eggs slightly in the top of a double boiler and add 1 tbsp. top milk or evaporated milk for each egg used. Season with salt and pepper and cook until smooth and creamy over boiling water, stirring frequently. Heap on the breakfast toast cut in triangles, dust with paprika and serve while piping hot.

IF IT'S DINNER FOR MOTHER—Begin with a dressy opening course such as orange and grapefruit chunks in grapefruit shells. Garnish with a berry, cherry or a stuffed olive. When planning the rest of the menu, remember that chicken is a party dish. Plan to fix it with new boiled potatoes, fresh green beans, peas or asparagus. For dessert, there's no prettier one than ice cream on canned peach halves.
