



Weekend Fishing
Trot season opens in earnest in these parts Saturday and chances are that the lakes in these parts will be getting a heavy play over the weekend.

Choice spots opening up Saturday include Lake of the Woods, Odell, Crescent, Agency and the upper half of the Upper Klamath and all other lakes in the county except for that part of Davis lake which lies in Klamath, way up in the north end of the county.

Most of Davis lake is in Deschutes county and the season there opens May 30. That's more for fly fishing.

A nice Sunday trip for the fisherman and his family this weekend would be to take a swing around the Upper Klamath, seeing some beautiful scenery and also quite possibly catching some trout out of the water somewhere along the line.

The state secondary road around the west side of the lake is in good condition all the way to Fort Klamath.

On the way around you could wet a line in the top half of the lake, opening Saturday, and in Cherry creek, Rock creek, Three Mile creek, Sevenmile and Wood River.

All the rage right now among fishermen is that part of the Deschutes below Wickiup dam, where the trout are reported to be biting almost anything that hits the water.

Lake of the Woods will be open this weekend and resorters are expecting a good season there. The lake was dotted with boats last Sunday and the road is open all the way. Fish lake is yielding some catches now but the road from Lake of the Woods to Fish lake is not open.

The county isn't working on it. Parties going in have gone around into Jackson county and up.

Eighteen thousand legal sized rainbow are now being released in South Twin lake, Deschutes county, by the game commission, but don't go after them yet. South Twin season opens June 29.

Red Sox Stand 7-3 Chance To Grab Pennant

Of past records, the Boston Red Sox stand a seven-to-three chance of winning the American league pennant.

In defeating the Chicago White Sox, 7-5, yesterday to stretch their winning streak to 14 straight games, the Red Sox joined 10 other junior circuit clubs which have won 14 or more consecutive games since the loop was organized in 1901. Seven of these went on to capture the flag.

The Red Sox need only a victory over the Yankees in their series opener at New York today to record the longest winning streak in the American league since the A's swept through 17 consecutive wins in 1931. Should Boston sweep the weekend three-game set, the Sox will rank second only to Chicago's hitless wonders of 1906. The National league record is 28 by the New York Giants in 1916.

Phenomenal hitting has been the chief reason for Boston's greatest winning streak in the history of the club. In yesterday's win, for instance, Pitchers Jim Bagby and Mace Brown were belted for 15 hits, yet came out on top with the help of some lusty slugging by Bobby Doerr, Ted Williams and Johnny Pesky.

Boxing Hit Hard
In the last three games, eight Boxer tilters have yielded 51 hits, an average of 17 per game and still Boston won all three. The reason is the batting average of Pesky, .427; Williams, .424, and Don DiMaggio, .386. The club as a whole is hitting an even .300. A fourth-inning two-run homer by Doerr—the league's leader in runs batted in—proved the ultimate margin of victory yesterday. It enabled Red Sox to increase their league lead to four and a half games over the second place Yankees.

Nelson Potter, an old Yankee jinx who hasn't been beaten by the New Yorkers in two years, gained his fifth straight triumph over the MacCartymen when he pitched the St. Louis Browns to a 6-1 victory. Potter gave up but four hits and lost his shutout when Charlie Keller tagged him for a home run. A pair of four-masters by Chuck Stevens and Frank Mancuso tied the game for the Sewellmen, who moved into the first division.

Mize Clouts Fifth
Homers played an important part in the New York Giants' 6-1 triumph over the Pittsburgh Pirates. Johnny Mize banked his fifth round tripper and Rook Jack Graham his first to help Bill Vossie gain his second win. The Giants moved into a fourth place National league tie with the Chicago Cubs.

The Cubs were beaten, 5-2, in 12 innings by Billy Southworth's rejuvenated Boston Braves. Tied at two-all in the 12th, the Tribe tallied on a double steal by Johnny Hopp and Tommy Holmes with Hopp racing across, and added two more on Stu Hofferth's timely single. The victory advanced the Braves to third place.

Brooklyn missed an opportunity to move into a first place tie with the idle St. Louis Cardinals when the Dodgers came out on the short end of an 8-7 score against the Cincinnati Reds. The Brooks almost duplicated Wednesday's uphill victory with a three-run outburst in the eighth and another tally in the ninth, but were squelched when the potential tying run was nipped at the plate. Second Baseman Lonnie Frey of the Reds a National league mark when he handled 11 assists, a mark held by many other keystone guardians.

Tigers Rebounding
Continuing to rebound from their seven-game losing skein, the Detroit Tigers made it five wins in succession when they edged out Washington's Senators, 9-8, in another 12-inning affair. Eddie Mayo's two-run single in the top of the 12th offset a single tally by the Nats in the bottom half to give Relief Pitcher George Caster the decision.

Russ Derry, recently acquired from the New York Yankees, faced out three doubles to lead the Philadelphia Athletics to a 7-6 win over the Cleveland Indians. The A's blasted Don Black, former teammate, from the hill in the first round with a five-run spree, but had to break a 6-6 tie with a single marker in the sixth frame.

The Philadelphia Phillies joined the Cards in a day off.

TEXAS TAKING HOUSTON LEAD
HOUSTON, Tex., May 10 (AP)—A couple of ex-Texans—Ben Hogan and Lloyd Mangrum—led the way into the second round of Houston's \$10,000 tournament of champions today and if they stumble there's a permanent resident of the Lone Star state ready to take over.

Hogan, the mighty atom from Hershey, Pa., and Mangrum, who hails from Los Angeles, shot four-under-par 87's yesterday to tie for the top in the first 18 holes. A strike behind—and but for a balky putter he would have been the leader—came Jimmie Demaret, Houston's pride.

Thirteen players of the field of 30 professionals and 14 amateurs bettered par 35-36—71 on the 6558-yard River Oaks course.

Limit Being Caught In Fish Lake

Trout Outlook Over State Spotty; Salmon Catches Tapering Off

PORTLAND, May 10 (AP)—Oregon fishermen face prospects of only poor to fair angling conditions this weekend, although some good catches have been reported in coastal and a few Willamette valley streams, the state game commission said today.

The outlook is bright. Columbia—Fair catches reported in southern portion. Salmon fishing has tapered off due to start of commercial season.

Yamhill—Weather favorable, water clear but catches have been poor.

Benton—Fair catches on most streams.

Marion—Streams just fair. Santiam river too high. Lakes in higher elevations difficult to reach due to snow.

Polk—If weather holds, angling should be good.

Clatsop—Most streams are full of red horse suckers. Outlook fair.

Trolling In Tidewater
Linn—A few trout have been taken by trolling in tidewater of Alsea, Yaquina and Siletz rivers.

Lane—In western part angling fair with good catches of trout taken from Lake creek, Deadwood and Indian creeks with spinner, worms and flies. Good catches from the Siuslaw on bucktail flies. Bass being taken from Siltcoos, Mercer and Munsel lakes on plugs.

Curry—Fair catches of cutthroat from Garrison and Flora lakes on spinner and worms. Trout fishing has been very poor. Salmon fishing in Rogue has been spotty.

Coos—Fair angling on bait in Eel lake. North fork of Coos river yielding limit catches on spinner and worms. Coquille river fair.

Wasco—Lower Deschutes improving slightly.

Josephine—Angling poor.

Fish Lake Good
Jackson—Fish lake angling good with limits of eastern brook and large rainbow being taken on troll with flashers and worms as well as on Doc Shelton type spinners and worms. Willow creek, Big Butte creek and Four-bit creek good. Best results with worms and single eggs and small spinner. Little Butte creek, North Fork and South Fork fair. Angling poor on upper Rogue. Deer creek good. Dead Indian area poor.

Baker—Streams high and muddy.

Union—Angling poor.

Yankee Clipper Hitting Only .247

NEW YORK, May 10 (AP)—Joe DiMaggio's mysterious slump has tossed a heavy burden on the New York Yankee pitching staff as the club opens a three-game set with the boisterous Boston Red Sox, winners of their last 14 straight.

Jolting Joe has gone to the plate 10 times without a smell of a base hit since he singled off Thornton Lee in the first inning of Monday's game with Chicago. His dropping batting average, now down to .247, appears to have affected his fielding for he dropped an easy fly ball yesterday that he should have caught in his back pocket, and booted a ground single for another error.

"I don't know what's the matter," explained DiMaggio. "I can see the ball coming up there okay, even the other day when Bob Feller was throw-

ing that no-hitter, but I can't seem to get back in stride."

Observers of DiMaggio's style noted he has been hitting to right field more than usual and not pulling the ball to left and left center, as is his custom.

Nobody expects the Yankee Clipper's hit famine to last much longer but, with Nick Etten hitting only .241, Tommy Henrich batting .250 and George Stinnett at a .202 level, it's rough on the New York pitchers.

If Joe Gordon's charityhorse permits him to return to the lineup today, Marse Joe McCarthy will have two 300 hitters in the lineup, for Charley Keller continues his .362 slugging pace. However, Joe Cronin's sockers from the hub have seven 300 hitters in the regular lineup. When Dave Ferris works, he can make it eight.
