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Home Demonstration Work Seeks Exchange Of Ideas

Home demonstration work in the United States, being celebrated this week in a nationally-observed Home Demonstration Week, is based upon the need of country women for a source of contacts with new and better methods of homemaking, for some form of organization to insure better social contacts, to develop leadership among the women, and to give them a feeling of unity, according to Mrs. Winifred K. Gillen, county home demonstration agent, who points out that city women often have just as great a need of these things, and therefore the home economics extension work is expanding to include city dwellers as well.

The Klamath Falls home extension unit was organized last fall to meet these needs for a group of women in the city who had long been interested in the unit meetings in which their country-dwelling sisters took such satisfaction. Mrs. Ray Garrison, 2338 Garden avenue, took the steps of actually organizing the city group last September. Approximately 20 women attended the first meeting, when Mrs. Garrison was chosen as chairman, Mrs. A. E. Gross, 2432 Darrow street, vice chairman, and Mrs. Mark D. Taylor Jr., 2027 Oregon avenue, secretary and treasurer. There are now 43 members in the

Klamath Falls unit, giving it the largest membership of any unit in the county.

Local Unit Meets Monthly
The Klamath Falls unit holds one all-day meeting each month, with usually a potluck or planned luncheon at noon. Mrs. Gillen conducts a demonstration and lecture meeting every other month. On the alternate meeting dates, demonstrations of the topic under discussion are given by two members of the unit who have been specially trained by specialists from Oregon State college to present the meetings. This pattern is followed throughout the county.

The Klamath unit has adopted the practice of hiring a member to care for children of the mothers in attendance, thus insuring the mother peace of mind during the meetings, and the youngsters the best of care. Joining with the other groups in the county, the Klamath Falls group donated five dollars to the re-establishment of the Norwegian Women's

Institute, a project of the Associated Country Women of the World. The appetizing display of salads and dressings at the annual May 1 Homemakers' Festival was the contribution of this group to the county-wide project.

Malin and Merrill Meet
The unit at Malin holds meetings in the evening, rather than during the day, owing to the fact that the women feel more free to leave the family when father can be at home to care for them. Mrs. Austen Terry was chosen chairman of this group, Mrs. Emil Toffel, vice chairman, and Mrs. Dick Henzel, secretary and treasurer. The Malin unit boasts among its 200 members Mrs. Harry Mitchell, who lives on the California line. Since she has been a member of the State Home Extension staff at Oregon State college, and is a former acting state demonstration leader, she keeps her extension unit loyalties in Oregon.

Merrill, Malin's neighbor unit, has a membership of 37 women. Mrs. Lena Buck is chairman, Mrs. E. E. Kilpatrick, vice chairman, and Mrs. Anne Fruits, secretary and treasurer. Mrs. Kilpatrick, former County Home
