

Lake County Asks Secret Indian Vote

LAKEVIEW, May 11—Lake county court and the agricultural committee of the chamber of commerce have gone on record as favoring a secret ballot for the Klamath Indians upon senate bill 1313, sponsored by Senators Guy Cordon and Wayne Morse. The bill provides for the liquidation of the Klamath Indian reservation, and Lake county is interested in the bill because the reservation covers four townships in this county comprising about 90,000 acres.

In its letter to the Oregon senators urging the senate Indian affairs committee to provide for taking the secret ballot to determine the wishes of the Indians in the liquidation, Lake county court suggests that "proper safeguards should be made by the committee to protect the Indians from intimidation or threats of reprisals in the event the election results to not meet with the approval of the Indian service."

In the treaty of 1866 it is pointed out that the government reserved the right to liquidate the Klamath Indian reservation at any time it saw fit. No secret ballot has even been taken on the wishes of the Indians in the matter.

"Smothered With Kindness"
"If the Klamath Indians have been smothered with kindness these past 80 years, as the adverse report of the Indian bureau implies, it should have nothing to fear from a secret ballot," the Lake county court states in its letter.

Purpose of the bill is to get about \$20,000,000 on the tax roll of Klamath and Lake counties. The Indian service is currently seeking \$250,000 of surplus tribal funds to add deeded lands to the reservation, which is being fought, not only by the county courts of Klamath and Lake, but by many of the Indians of the reservation.

At 2 p. m. on May 16 and 17, Vivian Freeman, canning specialist from Portland will give a demonstration on home canning methods at the Winema hotel.

Safety Group Talks Meters

After tossing a bombshell at its last meeting when it recommended to the city council that parking meters be installed in downtown Klamath Falls, the traffic safety council last night discussed the matter but did not act on it in any way.
