Library Sought In Lake County

LAKEVIEW, May 13 (AP)—The presentation of filled petitions requesting funds for a county library met with a favorable reception last Wednesday at a meeting of the county court members. However, owing to a 5 per cent limitation, funds will not be made available for the project this year.

The petition bore the names of almost 400 taxpayers and covered a cross section of Lake county and the members of the county court are convinced of the fact that the citizens of Lake county are solidly behind the idea of adequate library facilities for all. Anticipating a tax adjustment which will make funds available with which to begin the project, the court further promised that space would be reserved in the new courthouse to house the new county library. A separate wing, with outside entrance, will be provided, together with fire-proof library equipment.

A committee, headed by Mrs. Mary McDonald, with Mrs. Anne Sprague acting as spokesman, presented the petitions, together with a tentative budget, carefully compiled under the direction of Eleanor Stephens, state librarian.

Aviation Program Slated At La Grande
LA GRANDE, May 13 (AP)—A flight training program, to be financed by the GI bill of rights student benefit fund, will be started here in about 30 days, Gene Miller of Eastern Oregon Airways reported today. MADRAS, May 13 (AP)—Culver, county seat of Jefferson from 1914 to 1916, is now an incorporated city. By a vote of 38 to 0, the incorporation was approved. Culver, eight miles south of here, is in the area which will receive water from the new Jefferson water district.

Truman Signs Airport Bill

WASHINGTON, May 13 (AP)—President Truman signed into law today legislation authorizing \$509,000,000 in federal expenditures during the next seven years for an airport construction and development program. The civil aeronautics administration has announced that \$351,250,000 has been earmarked for distribution by states but that no funds will be assigned for cities and communities until CAA engineers determine local needs. The law requires that states and municipalities match the federal money.

Rep. Randolph (D-W. Va.), one of those present when President Truman signed the measure, told reporters he estimated the seven-year program will mean 3000 new airports, and the improvement of 1600 others. The apportionment of funds, yet to be appropriated by congress is on a formula basis, one half in proportion to population and one half in proportion to area of the states. Both states and cities are permitted to deal directly with the CAA in providing their share of funds.

Fire Destroys Stored Forage

Fire destroyed a large feed shed and about 10 tons of baled hay and straw on the Karl Dehlinger ranch on the Merrill highway near Mt. Laki church Sunday afternoon.

The fire started in the hay in the shed, possibly from spontaneous combustion. It spread quickly through that building, and burned a pump house. It set fire to the end of a nearby potato cellar superstructure, but was stopped before it destroyed that facility.

There was a strong wind, but it was blowing in a favorable direction. The Merrill rural fire truck and the Klamath county fire truck answered calls for help, and neighbors also pitched in to stop the blaze.
