

Portland Cuts School Budget

PORTLAND, May 14 (AP)—A school budget of \$7,868,579 for 1946-47 which includes \$1,386,463 for Portland school directors hope to obtain in a special election levy or in federal grants has been approved here.

District Comptroller Andrew Comrie reported the original estimates of \$1,750,000 needed from the special election levy which was involved in a plea for a special legislature session had been revised. He said sales of foreclosed properties, heavier tax collections and payment of delinquent taxes will add \$400,000 to the district treasury during the fiscal year.

Plans for the election are going ahead under a 1917 law after the supreme court halted the levy vote planned originally under a 1937 act. A plea for a special session of the state legislature was rejected by Governor Snell, resulting in a demonstration by teen-age pupils protesting expected curtailment of school activities.

Woodworkers Take Ballot

SEATTLE, May 14 (AP)—A strike vote is now being taken with tabulation to be completed at Portland, Ore., headquarters, Walter Belka, district secretary-treasurer of the International Woodworkers of America (CIO) said yesterday.

He announced that "if a tie-up comes" in the shipping industry, "we will work very closely with striking CIO waterfront unions."

Belka attended a strategy meeting of maritime union leaders and was named secretary of the joint committee planning the action. His union, he said, represented 75,000 lumber workers in Montana, northern California, British Columbia, Idaho, Oregon and Washington.

In their current negotiations, the woodworkers seek elimination of differentials in pay for fir and pine workers, paid vacations and wage adjustments.

Fewer Salmon Run Willamette Falls

OREGON CITY, May 14 (AP)—Only about 7000 chinook salmon a week are migrating over Willamette Falls here, compared with 10,000 a week when the last count was made in 1933, the state fish commission said today.

The first week's count of the 1946 run was completed Saturday, and officials said the count would continue as long as salmon keep coming. Chinooks counted here have survived commercial fishermen on the Columbia and hundreds of sports fishermen on the Willamette.
