Pool Site Purchase Deferred

A recommendation from the recreation committee advising the purchase by the city of the Will Humphrey property on Main in the 2000 block for the site of the proposed city swimming pool was considered and tabled for further study by the city council last night.

The property is priced at \$12,000 with \$1000 of that sum donated, leaving a net of \$11,000. A petition from a group of people owning lots on Mortimer appeared on the council docket. The property owners requested that the city approve an alley behind their lots for "convenience and fire safety precaution." The petition pointed out that when driveways are blocked it is impossible for the fire department to get its equipment behind the property. A serious fire broke out in September, 1944, when buildings belonging to the petitioners were burned because fire-fighting equipment couldn't reach the rear of the property. The matter was referred to the fire chief for report and will be studied by the council.

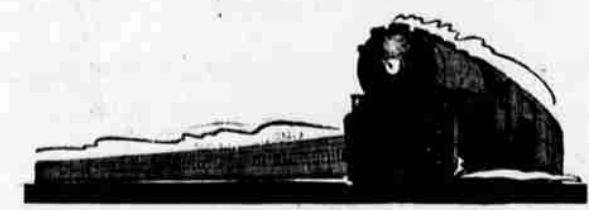
