

Baccalaureate Rites Open Graduation Week At Malin

MALIN, May 14—Members of the graduating class of the Malin high school attending baccalaureate services in the Presbyterian church Sunday night heard the Rev. Glen Morton, pastor, speak on "Freedom is a Dangerous Thing." Rev. Morton said that while freedom is a treasured privilege in moral, religious and material spheres, it also involves obligations that cannot be disregarded, particularly in the spiritual realm.
