

Senate Committee Asks Labor-Employer Probe

WASHINGTON, May 15 (AP)—A resolution calling for an investigation of the causes of labor disputes was approved today by the senate labor committee.

The resolution proposes that inquiry be made into "union and employer policies and practices."

Chairman Murray (D-Mont.) told reporters the resolution was approved without opposition.

Although some senators pressing for passage of labor control legislation looked on the move as an effort to stall, Murray said he is uncertain whether any effort

Beet Sugar Up In Idaho Plants

NYSSA, May 15 (AP)—Beet sugar production at the Amalgamated Sugar company's Nyssa-Nampa plants this year will exceed any previous season, the company announced today as it reported warehouses jammed with 400,000 sacks of 1945 crop sugar.

District Manager R. G. Larson announced the company must move the record backlog of 100 round sacks before it can store the new crop and estimated 5000 sacks a day must be moved this summer.

He estimated production this season at 2,500,000 bags compared to 1,610,000 last year because of an increase in beet acreage from 36,000 to 55,000.

Larson blamed rationing restrictions for the inability of the company to move the sugar.

No Delay Demanded
Before the committee met, Senator Ball (R-Minn.) told a reporter that he and other advocates of action now would oppose any move toward delay of these measures.

Murray said that if the senate approves the inquiry resolution, the labor committee will open hearings here. Later on a subcommittee will go to principal industrial centers to check up on union and management policies and their relation to labor disputes.

The resolution was sponsored by Senators Kilgore (D-W. Va.), Tamm (D-Ind.), Morse (R-Ore.), Mead (D-N. Y.), and La Follette (Prog-Wis.).

Morse told reporters he feels that the senate should postpone action on labor legislation until such a study is made. "At present, we have no data on which to proceed," he said.

Bartlett said that just after the war ended, and through the winter months, tourist courts and hotels were kept filled by traveling military personnel.

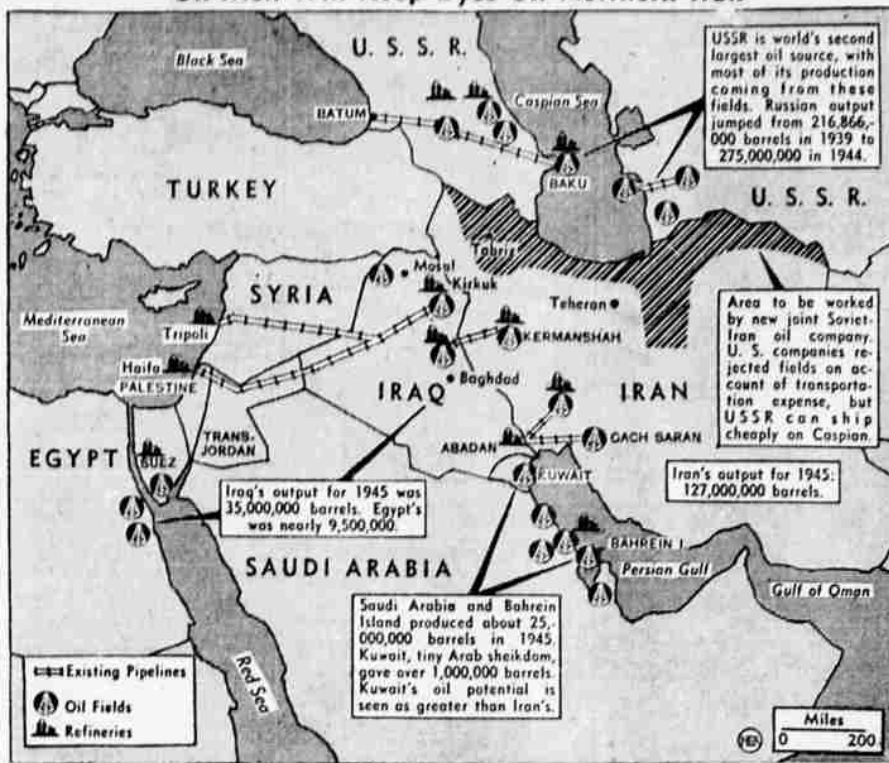

Standard Time Inaccurate For Numerous Localities

A correspondent at Prince Rupert, B. C., realizing the artificiality of daylight saving time, inquires, "Do clocks on standard time always read 'noon' when the sun is due south?"

No, standard time also is artificial. A few have never set their timepieces ahead the "daylight saving" hour as they avowedly prefer "God's time." But for a full realization of this ideal one must use a sundial, for its shadow-hand points always to 12 o'clock when old Sol beams down from the south.

Even a well-regulated clock will not long keep accurate sun time, principally because the earth's orbital velocity is not constant. We see this tiny irregularity in the uneven eastward motion of the sun among the stars. The tables for "sun slow" and "sun fast" on good sundials give corrections for clock time.

Some "sundial days" are almost 30 seconds longer than 24 "clock hours"; some, 20 seconds shorter. A clock set with a sundial on September 1 will, by cumulative effects, be over 16 minutes slow on November 1. But these non-conformities average themselves out four times a year so that clocks and sundials agree about April 15, June 15, September 1 and December 25. Such time kept by clocks is therefore sundial time for an ideal, evenly-moving "fictitious" sun.

Both the sundials and the

clocks just discussed give local time: the first, apparent local time; the second, mean (average) local time. Such are the best possible for all isolated communities which have no dealings with the outside world. But modern transportation and communication require more convenient methods, although more artificial. Along the northern border of the United States, the local time increases one minute for every 11 miles one goes eastward, or four minutes for each degree of longitude. Intolerable for railroad and telegraph systems!

In 1884, at the insistence of the railroads, standard time was adopted by most of the world. Across the vast expanse of Canada and the United States, only six official clock-readings are in existence simultaneously. These are the mean local times for the places at 60, 75, 90, 105, 120 and 135 degrees west longitude. These times are known as Atlantic, Eastern, Central, Mountain, Pacific and Yukon times. Theoretically, any locality should

use the time of its nearest standard meridian; but the separation lines between zones are often irregular.

As an illustration, Denver is almost astride the 105th meridian, so luckily uses practically its own mean local time. Salt Lake City, seven degrees westward, also uses Mountain time, but this reads 28 minutes later than its mean local time. To the east of Denver, each degree makes Mountain time four minutes too early. Failure to allow for these irregularities causes confusion in almanac times for sunrise and sunset, which are given for the standard meridians.

WASHINGTON, May 15 (AP)—Senator Warren G. Magnuson (D-Wash.) said last night mid-west corn, California barley or Montana wheat, and perhaps all three, may be moved into the Pacific northwest to tide livestock and poultry growers over the current feed shortage.

He said the agriculture department contemplated getting the corn on the market by suspension of government buying; moving California barley north; moving Montana wheat west for export shipment and grinding it in Washington so the residue could be made available for feed. Another plan would provide for the purchase of Commodity Credit corporation wheat for the stockmen.

Navy Officers Involved In Island Black Market

MANILA, May 15 (AP)—Five naval officers, up to the rank of commander, have been suspended from duty at Subic Bay submarine base pending completion of an investigation of suspected black market activities, Vice Adm. J. L. Kauffman, Philippine sea front commander, announced today.

"Preliminary investigation indicates black market activities involving the illegal use of government property amounting to a relatively few thousand dollars," Kauffman stated.

No charges have been filed against the officers, he said, pending completion of the inquiry.

It was understood that the thefts and sale of government property included nine movie projectors, a hot black market item in entertainment-starved Manila. Other equipment on the missing list included mattresses and building materials, both scarce in Manila.

Kauffman said that earlier reports of diversion of government property valued at \$2,000,000 were "gross exaggeration." Some erroneous stories had placed the suspected theft ring at the Olongapo naval base instead of at the Subic Bay station.

Alcoa Plans Alaska Rock Lime Import

PORTLAND, May 15 (AP)—The Aluminum Company of America has asked the commission of public docks here to provide unloading facilities for rock lime Alcoa plans to ship here from Alaska.

The company said it expects to ship 150,000 tons the first year for use in its Vancouver, Wash., plant but later will boost shipments of 1,000,000 tons annually to supply Columbia valley industries.
