# Senators Want Curbs To Stay

WASHINGTON, May 15 (AP)—The senate banking committee voted today to extend the life of the price control law a full year beyond the June 30 expiration date.

The house previously had voted only a nine-month extension and had hedged its approval with numerous restrictions.

Senator Barkley (D-Ky.) said the vote for the year's extension was "about 11 to five." Earlier, the committee had rejected a 10 to seven vote by Senator Butler (R-Mo.) for a nine-month extension.

Barkley said there was discussion of various plans for removing controls as the supply of commodities comes into line with demand but no action was taken.

# Poppy Sales Aid Veterans

Mrs. Lavilla Kehrl, Poppy chairman for the Oregon department of the American Legion auxiliary, in reporting on her year's work with the veteran hospitals at Roseburg and Portland, gave some outstanding figures. Over 400,000 poppies were made in Oregon's own veteran hospitals, or 109,400 more poppies than were made last year.

These poppies will be sold on the streets in every community in Oregon, Alaska and Hawaii. The only paid workers in the poppy program and sale are the veterans who make them. The balance of the money given for the poppy worn in honor of the war dead on May 25 and 26, is put in a restricted fund by the local and state units, for rehabilitation work and child welfare only.

Sometimes the money made by the veteran making poppies is the only source of income he has at the time. It is an aid to muscular activity and development also, for those who have had arm or nerve disorders. Mrs. H. W. Petrick, local chairman, urges every one to wear a "Veteran Made Poppy" on Poppy Day, May 25.
