

Reds Attack Manchurian Nationalists

The Chinese government commander in Manchuria reported today his forces south of the capital of Changchun were under attacks of mounting intensity from communist artillery and strafing warplanes.

Gen. Tu Li-ming, the government commander, said two communist planes yesterday strafed government supply trains in southern portion of Szechingka, where some of his finest troops have been stalled for weeks.

An increasing number of communist warplanes were reported sighted in this fighting zone of south central Manchuria.

Tu claimed his troops held the southern portion of Szechingka with the communists in control of the northern section. He said the fighting inside the city was restricted to minor skirmishes.

Guns and Planes Attack
The communists, however, poured in a heavy artillery barrage on the southern part of the city yesterday while their warplanes were striking at the supply trains, Tu declared.

Renewed fighting in north China and the wounding of two U. S. marines also were reported. The government's central news agency asserted the marines were wounded when a Tientsin-Chinwangtao express train was fired on 45 miles north of Tientsin. It said marine headquarters is investigating.

The agency reported from Taiyuan, capital of Shansi province, two communist regiments and reinforcements totaling 2,000 men attacked government forces south of Yinghsien last Thursday and after an hour's battle entered the village.

The dispatch said the incident had been referred to the Tatum truce team.

Fighting in Kiangsu
Another central news dispatch asserted fighting had developed in northern Kiangsu province, where part of the communist new fourth army of 50,000 men had arrived at Kukao and was blockading the city, and 100,000 other communists were poised for an assault on Nantung, occupied by government troops.

In Peiping, however, hopes for a truce when Lt. Gen. Cheng Kai-min, government representative at (truce) headquarters, flew to Nanking on a special trip believed to be connected with resumption of talks by General Marshall's peace committee.
