

# Nickel Firms Accused In Trust Suit

NEW YORK, May 16 (AP)—The government filed in federal court today a civil complaint charging a Canadian nickel company, its New York City subsidiary, and three officers of the firm with violation of anti-trust laws in connection with the importation, manufacture, distribution and sale of nickel ores, nickel and nickel products.

The firms, described by the government as the world's largest producers of nickel, are the International Nickel Company of Canada, Ltd., and its subsidiary, the International Nickel Company, Inc. Individuals named were Robert C. Stanley, John F. Thompson and Paul D. Merica—president, executive vice president and vice president, respectively, of both companies.

The anti-trust division of the department of justice, which filed the suit, charged the firms preserved a monopoly position by cartel agreements with French and German competitors, including the I. G. Farben Industries of Germany.

Attorney General Tom C. Clark, said in a statement released here:

"This case is among the most important in our anti-trust program for eliminating restraints and monopolies in basic industries. The complaint charges that the defendants conspired to restrain trade in and monopolized the nickel industry in violation of the Sherman act."

The suit seeks complete separation of the business of the Canadian corporation and its American subsidiary, and asks that a plan be formulated by the court for redistributing the assets of the firms to destroy their alleged monopoly, to prevent a continuation of the alleged trade restraints, and to open the nickel industry in the United States to competition.

# 2 Choices In Surveyor Race

The little-known political activity between Frank Z. Howard and Wally Hector, both republican candidates for county surveyor, is one of the two matters to be settled by Klamath county voters tomorrow.

The other settlement will be made in the hotter race between David R. Vandenberg and Clarence A. Humble, both running for circuit judge. The bench is non-partisan, but only registered republicans may cast a ballot for surveyor.

Frank Z. Howard is the present surveyor, having been elected in 1942, and is finishing his first term in office. He is a veteran of World War I, has 30 years experience as a civil engineer and surveyor and is a republican party leader in the county.

Wally Hector at present is county engineer, appointed to that post by the county court. The work done by the two offices is closely allied and it is Hector's aim, if elected surveyor, to combine the offices of surveyor and engineer.

Hector is a lifelong resident of Klamath Falls and received his engineering education at Oregon State. He has had 15 years of experience in engineering.

Duties of the county surveyor are twofold, those pertaining to surveys, records, boundaries and the like as provided by the legislature, which made it an elective office, and those delegated to the surveyor by the county court.

The engineer's duties are laid down by the county court and have to do with the construction and maintenance of county roads, in cooperation with the roadmaster.

Neither Howard nor Hector have done much active campaigning but in the past few
