SEATTLE, May 16 (AP)—An innovation in long transport was carried out here yesterday when a barge load of logs was unloaded for the Seattle Cedar Lumber Manufacturing company.

The load of 600,000 feet of red cedar logs was the first towed here from Uluet inlet, at the northwest end of Vancouver Island.

Officials of the tug company handling the tow said it was the first time barges have been used to bring logs from British Columbia to Seattle, although the practice is common at other northwest ports.

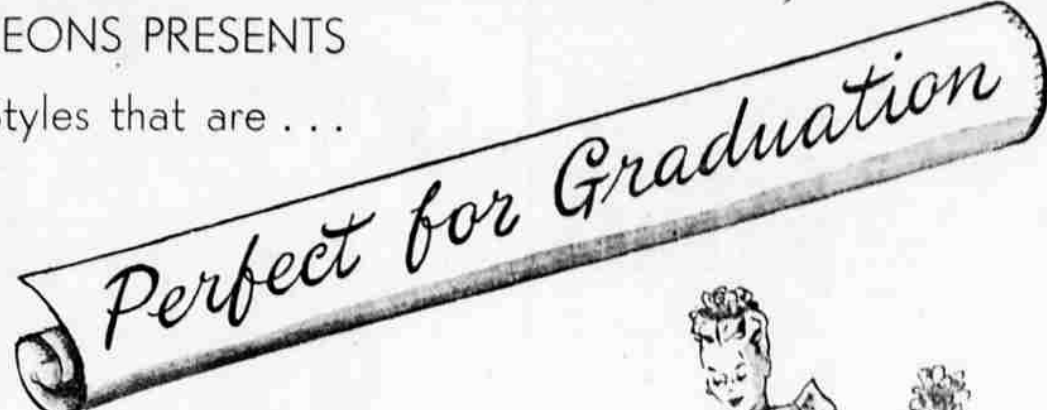

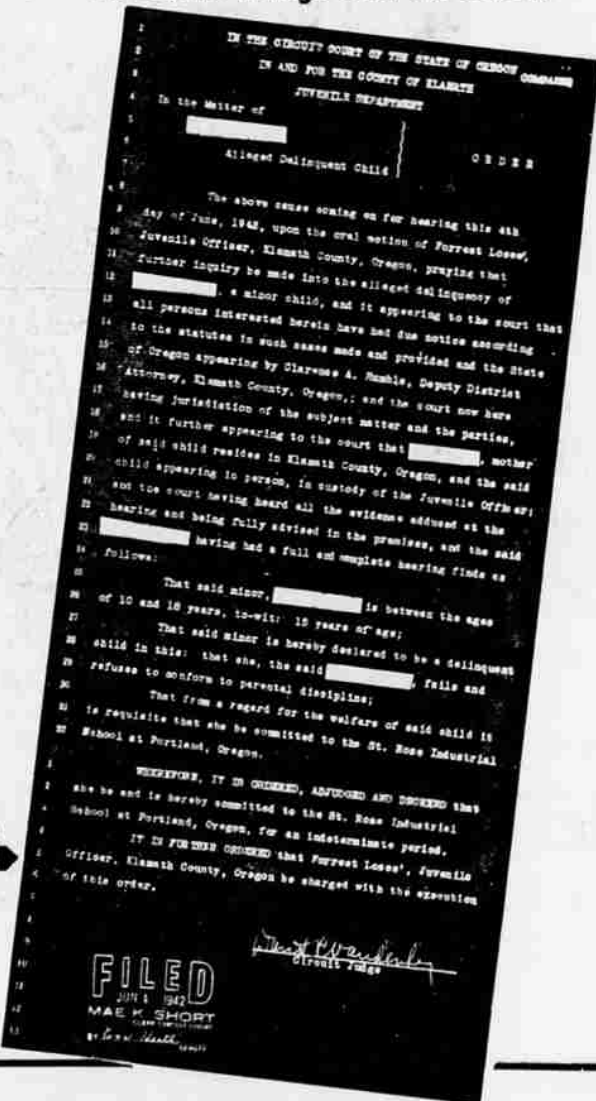
