

# 26 Killed In Virginia Air Crash

RICHMOND, Va., May 16 (AP) — Twenty-six persons were killed today in the crash of a south-bound chartered airliner which ran into trouble a few minutes after its takeoff from Byrd airport near Richmond and plunged into a rain-drenched stand of pine woods in a vain attempt to return to the field.

The twin-engine Viking airliner came to grief in the heavy overcast about 1:10 a. m., plowed through the trees and burned on the soggy banks of Doran creek only a few thousand yards from the airport.

The airliner left Newark, N. J., early last night for Atlanta. It put into Richmond and took off again about 12:30 a. m. in heavy weather. The ceiling at the airport was fluctuating between zero and 200 feet and visibility was one mile when she took off.

The CAA said the plane carried 24 passengers and a crew of two. A farmer, William Walton who lives near the scene in Henrico county, said he counted 26 bodies—20 men, three women, and three children.

the other, competed in each baking a two-layer cake. The women were Ruth Peyton and Lola Truax, and the men, Jack Almeter and John Wright. Two men and two women judged the cakes, pronouncing the women's cake the best in texture, color and taste.

Also part of the demonstration by Mrs. Wells, was a banana steam pudding and Swiss steak cooked in an electric cooker well, a prime roast of beef and several steamed vegetables. Mrs. Wells explained the use of the different electrical units and pointed out the variation in time necessary for cooking at higher altitudes from that at sea level. Lucile Tweed, representing the vocational education department assisted in the demonstration.

The next meeting will be the last of the series and will include a potluck dinner and a film, "The Way to a Man's Heart," filmed by the National Livestock and Meat Board in San Francisco. This moving picture will present the best cuts of meat, textures, sound recipes and best methods of cooking.

There were about 50 persons present at the meeting, with men and women representing the business field, including butchers, store operators and appliance salespeople.
