## Bonanza 4-H Calves Gain

Six calves of the Triple "B" 4-H Beef club of Bonanza made a gain of 756 pounds in 49 days. This is an average gain of 2.57 pounds per day average again for the six calves, according to Francis Skinner, county club agent, who weighed the calves Saturday, May 11. The largest gain was made by Pat Givan's calf. His calf gained 165 pounds, which is a daily gain of 3.37 pounds.

The other club members' calves gained as follows: Vernon Haley, 135 pounds, 2.76 pounds daily gain; Adele Brown, 124 pounds, 2.53 pounds daily gain; Jackie McAuliffe, 124 pounds, 2.53 pounds daily gain; Marjory Brown, 115 pounds, 2.35 pounds daily gain; Marianna Hellekson, 93 pounds, 1.90 pounds daily gain. The other club member, Jackie Challis, weighed his calf for the first time.

The club members with John Hayden, the local leader, met the club agent at Bonanza, and made the complete circuit, weighing calves.
