

# New 41st Division Plans Include Only Two States

TACOMA, May 18 (AP)—Maj. Maurice Thompson, acting state adjutant general, said today reactivation of the 41st national guard division will be confined to Washington and Oregon according to plans made by the recent state adjutant general meeting in Washington, D. C. Under the new setup Idaho, which had been included in earlier 41st division plans, has been allotted a combat team, including an infantry regiment, which will be unattached to any division. Before World War II Wyoming and Montana, as well as Idaho, contributed to the 41st. Activation of the division's headquarters company and of certain other priority units will begin July 1, the general said. Division headquarters will be located in whichever of the two states appoints the divisional commander. Which will make the first appointment has not been decided, the general said, but it is agreed that the appointment in future will rotate between the states, and consequently location of the headquarters will rotate.

# Ukraine Grain Ruin Impends

MOSCOW, May 18 (AP)—World grain estimates were revised sharply downward today following a report by Marshall MacDuffie, American chief of the UNRRA mission to the Ukrainian republic, that a prolonged drought threatened disaster to the grain crop of Russia's great bread basket. "We have reported to UNRRA that unless there is rain within two weeks the effect will be ruinous," MacDuffie disclosed at a press conference here yesterday. He said the Ukraine's crop prospects would discourage food officials throughout the world, who have been hoping that Russia would produce enough grain to increase her exports and contributions to other countries. (In Washington, a strategically placed official said that Premier Stalin had rejected an appeal by President Truman that Russia work with the United States and Britain in combating famine throughout the world. He said the rejection was based on the contention that the appeal came too late.) MacDuffie said the drought threat was so immediate that the grain crop for the Ukraine—an area more than twice the size of New York, New Jersey and Pennsylvania—might be less than half the 1940 total, unless there was rain within a week or two.

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# Ex-County Resident Dies in Car Smash

Arthur L. Goss, 43, a former resident of Klamath county, was killed in an automobile accident near West Stayton, Ore., Thursday. His father, R. L. Goss, was seriously injured. Arthur Goss was born in Billings, Mont., and lived for approximately 20 years in Bonanza and Klamath Falls. He later moved to Salem where he has been engaged in farming. Besides his wife he is survived by his father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. R. L. Goss of West Stayton, one sister, Mrs. Shelby Whitman of Pendleton, and a brother, Lorenzo Goss of West Stayton. Funeral services will be held Sunday, May 19, in West Stayton.

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# Lakeview Gets Grain Elevator

LAKEVIEW, May 18—An elevator with a storage capacity of 80,000 bushels is under construction south of the present buildings of the Lake County Cooperative. Additional units can be added as future needs demand. Specifications call for a bulk unloading pit with automatic truck lift and an additional pit where bags may be cut without interfering with bulk unloading. An automatic scale will be built for bulk load into cars. The main pit is to be 14 feet deep and 38 feet long. This pit will be reinforced steel and concrete with a heavy solid steel lining to prevent water seepage. This enormous steel box is being built by Streiby Welding company, the cement is being supplied by Lakeview Building Material company and the lumber is coming from local mills. The Wiley Construction company, elevator specialists of Walla Walla, Wash., is constructing the building. This structure is one of the first to receive approval of the new civilian production corporation recently set up by congress to handle materials. The building is to be completed in time for the fall harvest.
