

New Strikeout Mark In Grasp Of Bob Feller

At the rate blazing Bobby Feller of the Cleveland Indians has been setting the American league batters down on strikes this season, the mid-western meteor should better the modern major league record of 343 strikeouts in one season, with plenty to spare.

It was back in 1904 that eccentric Rube Waddell set the standard while pitching for the Philadelphia Athletics and it has defied the mighty arms of Big Ed Walsh, Walter Johnson, Smokey Joe Wood, Cy Young, Christy Mathewson, Lefty Grove, Dazzy Vance, Dizzy Dean and other renowned strikeout artists for more than 40 years.

The Van Meter, Iowa, speedster fanned 14 Nats yesterday in pitching the Indians to a 3-0 victory in the opener of a double-header with Washington, to raise his eight-game total to 85 in 71 innings.

With 127 games remaining on the Tribe's schedule, Feller, fourth day, should appear in 32 more contests. Should Bob continue at his current gait of 101 strikeouts per game, he will rack up the amazing total of 431, far exceeding the record.

In registering his fifth triumph and his third via the shutout route Feller gained an even split for the Indians. The Nats pounded Joe Krukavkas for nine hits to win the second game, halted by darkness at the end of eight innings, 9-4.

Brooks Regains First
Feller's performance stole some of the spotlight from Brooklyn's dazzling Dodgers who regained first place in the National league for the third time when they clubbed the Pittsburgh Pirates to their fifth straight defeat, 16-6. The St. Louis Cardinals fell to second place by losing to Boston's Braves.

With 37 players taking part in the most ragged game played at Ebbetts' field in years, the Brooks took advantage of eight walks by six Buc hurlers and six Pirate errors in addition to pounding out 16 safeties and stealing five bases to earn the one-sided decision. A seven-run inning clinched matters for the Dodgers.

Holmes Hitting
Pitcher Johnny Sain and Right Fielder Tommy Holmes collaborated to whip St. Louis 4-1, and knock the Redbirds out of the league lead. Sain chalked up his fourth victory, holding the Cards at bay in all but the fourth inning and limiting them to seven hits. Holmes rapped out two doubles and a single and drove in a pair of runs. The triumph elevated the Braves into third place.

Two-run homer by Charlie Keller, his sixth of the season, and brilliant relief pitching by Randy Gumpert enabled the New York Yankees to defeat the Chicago White Sox, 4-2, and gain a half game on the American league leading Boston Red Sox who were rained out of their scheduled night affair with the St. Louis Browns.

Tigers Beat Philly
An error by Second Baseman Irv Hall set up a two-run eighth inning for Detroit and enabled Virgil Trucks and the Tigers to edge out the Philadelphia Athletics, 3-1.

Philadelphia's Phils dropped Cincinnati into the second division by upsetting the Reds, 4-2, under the lights. Rain forced a halt after six and a half innings had been played. Rain prevented the New York Giants from meeting the Chicago Cubs under the lights.

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Klamath High Places In Three State Track Events

CORVALLIS, May 18 (AP)—The mighty Bend Lava Bears qualified for six final events to emerge as strong favorites today for team laurels in the state high school track and field meet.

In yesterday's preliminaries, Bend took first in the shot put, high hurdles, 440 and 100-yard dash, and made lesser marks in the low hurdles and broad jump. No prelims were held in the pole vault, and George Rasmussen was doped a certainty to win that event.

Despite clear, windless weather, no records were set. The 60 boys from 31 schools who qualified for today's finals made creditable times and distances, however. Winners had easy going in many heats.

Hillsboro was rated a likely second-place winner today, after taking four finals spots. Jack and Jerry Doyle, Hillsboro brothers, left the field far behind to win first in their heats in the high and low hurdles.

Seven schools qualified for three events: Salem, Klamath Falls, Grants Pass, Ashland, Medford, Prineville and Grant Cottage Grove, Pendleton, North Bend, Molalla, Hermiston, Woodburn, Silverton, Springfield, Hood River, Beaverton, Eugene, and Columbia Prep and Roosevelt of Portland.

Angels Perched On Coast's Top Rung

Los Angeles, surpassing the San Francisco Seals' own forie in baseball, hurled them from the Pacific Coast league pinnacle and roosted on top with a half-game edge today.

Heavy was the fall of the pitcher-proud Seals, whose mound staff grabbed the lead 49 games ago in the March 29 opener and clung to it until a Los Angeles rookie last night threw them too much of their own kind of stuff.

Southpaw Cliff Chambers delivered the Angels' 4-2 victory, whizzing them over so fast the Seals connected with but three, and whiffing 11 batters. The game gave Chambers his sixth win of the season and made him the strikeout leader of the league, with a total of 69.

Melton Nicked
San Francisco's mound department had no excuses, for it was represented by its top man, eight-game winner Cliff Melton, who was nicked for 10 hits and his second loss of the season.

The defeat reduced the Seals to a second-place deadlock with Manager Casey Stengel's rapidly rising Aorns of Oakland, who administered their fourth successive dunking, 4 to 1, to the Hollywood Stars.

Bunched with Hollywood far behind the three clubs battling for the league lead were the San Diego Padres, who downed Sacramento, 3 to 1, to even

their series at two games apiece, and the Seattle Rainiers, who beat Portland, 6 to 2, for their third win in four games of the series.

Homer Clinches Win
The Aorns nicked two Hollywood pitchers for seven hits, putting over two runs in the third inning, when Brooks Holder homered with Pitcher Bryan Stings aboard. Butch Moran singled home Tony Lupien, who had doubled, for the Stars' lone tally.

Seattle shoved across five runs in a weird seventh inning after Portland had established a one-score margin. For the high point of the seventh, Hal Patchett, falling away from a close pitch, hit without trying, and the ball blooped into left field, bobbed along the floor line and disappeared under a roll of canvas. Patchett got to second, and two runs came in.

Ed Vitalich gave up six hits while his San Diego teammates got five in the victory over the Sacramento Solons. Losing pitcher was Guy Fletcher, who loaded the bags on walks in the third inning and was then touched by Deb Garms for a two-run single.

PORTLAND, May 18 (AP)—Woodburn, Ore.'s hard hitting Joe Kahut scored a four-round technical knockout here last night over Bob Nestell of Los Angeles. Kahut weighed 180, Nestell 188.
