Fisher said any young man interested in the fire guard job could contact him by mail addressed to Lava Beds national monument, Tulelake, Calif. Fisher advised that he preferred ex-servicemen 18 years of age or over. While in San Francisco the custodian discussed problems of the monument.

Roger Reid of Malin and Fred Shegman of North Bend have been named seasonal rangers at the monument this year and Lillian Redkey of KUHS staff will be in charge of the Schonchin Butte lookout for the second year.

Half Million Refund To Sailor Taxpayer

DUNKIRK, N. Y., May 20 (AP)—A federal income tax refund for more than a half-million dollars has come to an 18-year-old navy seaman who had expected a refund of about \$23, the boys father said today.

Thomas G. Richir said a check for \$355,555.55 came in the mail Saturday.

"My eyes almost popped out of my head," he added. His son, Thomas, now stationed at the San Diego naval base, was employed for a short time last year by the New York Telephone company in Olean.

Richir said he wanted "to keep the check and frame it."

In New York, a spokesman for the internal revenue bureau said such a check likely would be due to a mechanical error, adding that an investigation would be made.

Heavy Fire Damage In Rochester, Wash.

CENTRALIA, Wash., May 20 (AP)—Five frame business buildings, a third of the entire town of Rochester, 13 miles northwest of here, were destroyed by fire of unknown origin early Sunday.

Thurston county Sheriff Frank C. Tamblin said the blaze apparently broke out in a barber shop and pool hall.

In answer to a radio appeal from Sheriff Tamblin, Olympia, Chehalis and other nearby towns sent fire fighting equipment to help fight the flames.

Gasoline in a garage and exploding ammunition in a blazing store seriously hampered fire fighters for a time.

Parking Limits To Be Enforced

Columbia River Up, June 15 Crest Seen

PORTLAND, May 20 (AP)—Columbia river levels below Bonneville dam are rising and will reach a crest about June 15, Eckley Ellison, senior meteorologist at the Portland river district office, reported today.

He said the river was at 17.3 feet at Vancouver, Wash., two feet, three inches above flood stage and will reach 21 feet there at the crest. He predicted only minor flooding of the lowest areas along the Columbia.

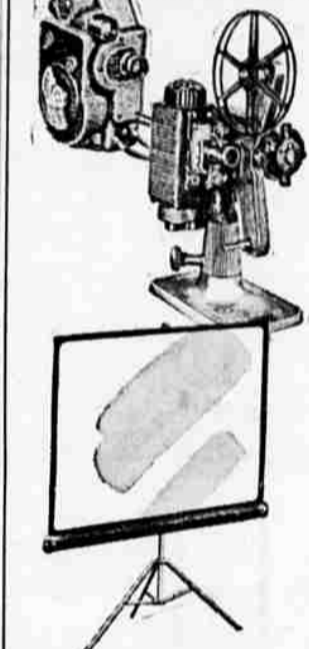
