

Fire Sweeps Peyton Co. At Dorris

DORRIS, May 20—A huge lumber ramp and about 100 cords of wood, located in Dorris and owned by Peyton and company of Klamath Falls, has been burning since about 6 o'clock Sunday night but is under control now and being allowed to burn out.

A stiff wind is blowing in Dorris today and a fire guard has been thrown around the ramp to keep the flames from spreading.

The fire is about 50 yards away from stacked lumber belonging to the Dorris Lumber and Moulding company but the stacked lumber is not in danger, watchers believe.

Origin of the fire was undetermined. It broke out late yesterday afternoon and the cord wood stacked at the ramp is burning on the inside. Fire-fighting apparatus was brought to the scene last night and wet the cord wood down without putting out the fire, and the ground around the ramp was soaked to prevent spreading.

The ramp, about 18 feet high and 120 feet long, was built by Peyton and company two years ago.

Lumber Men Go To Bend

Oregon pine industry leaders will gather at Pilot Butte inn, Bend, May 24, for a conference of the state forest practice committee of the Western Pine association, and for a forestry field trip. J. F. Daggett, Prineville, formerly of Klamath Falls, is committee chairman. Stuart Moir, Portland, chief forester for the association, will attend.

Following the morning committee session there will be a joint afternoon meeting with representatives of state and federal forest land management agencies for a discussion of problems of mutual interest. On Saturday, May 25, the southern Oregon section of the Society of American Foresters will conduct a field trip to the Pringle Falls region, where demonstration areas in virgin Ponderosa pine have been established to show different methods of timber selection, forest operation and management.

In announcing the meeting, industry leaders stressed that in striving to meet the challenge of the vast housing program with its demand for lumber, Oregon's pine mills are not neglecting the forest future but are keeping in force essential good forest practices to assure continuous timber growth to meet future needs.

More Access Roads Planned For State

PORTLAND, Ore., May 20 (AP)—Seventy miles of northwest access roads being planned by the U. S. forest service will open nearly 500,000,000 board feet of timber annually to production, the regional forester said here.

H. J. Andrews said the roads—awaiting fund allocation and available material—will lead to the Clackamas river area, east Clackamas county and Umpqua river region, Douglas county. The road program will also effect the smaller timber areas of

the McKenzie river's south fork east of Eugene, Cheshnimmus area in Willowa county, and Little River area in Douglas county.

The forest area of the United States, exclusive of Alaska, is larger than the combined area of France, Germany, Norway, Italy, Sweden, Belgium and The Netherlands.

GRANTS PASS, May 20 (AP)—A Douglas county rancher and his weekend guest were killed late Saturday in the flaming wreckage of a small two-place airplane in which they were flying at the Foreman ranch 20 miles north of here.

State Police Sgt. C. R. Borgman identified the victims as James O'Donnell, 21, Lang Beach, Calif., owner of the plane, and Arle Foreman, 26, of the Foreman ranch near Glendale, Ore., where the crash occurred.

Sgt. Borgman reported the family of Foreman witnessed the crash as the plane attempted a landing after "buzzing" the ranch home and apparently struck a tree top.
