

Drought Hits Cattle Hopes For Oregon

SALEM, May 20 (AP)—The outlook for Oregon livestock production is becoming worse with dry weather adding to the problems created by the feed shortage and higher feed prices, agriculture officials said today.

Pasture conditions are rapidly approaching a critical state because of the dry weather, with hill pastures drying up much earlier than usual. This will be

hardest on dairymen, reducing milk production early in the peak season.

The feed shortage is as bad as ever, and feed prices have jumped up.

There already have been reports that chicken and turkey flocks are being liquidated because of the feed shortage.

Larger Turkey Reduction
The U. S. department of agriculture's May 1 turkey report confirmed estimates that the number of turkeys raised in Oregon this year will represent more than twice the reduction recommended in crop goals for Oregon. The USDA estimate now is for a 35 per cent cut against the goal of a 15 per cent reduction.

Oregon's 1946 water supply prospects are good, in spite of the rainfall deficiency in April, Oregon State college experts report.

Because of record-breaking snow in the Cascades, prospects for stream flow in the spring and summer are good. Water stored in irrigation reservoirs is 6 per cent more than a year ago, and 2 per cent more than the 1936-45 average.

Russia Claims First Radio

MOSCOW, May 20 (AP)—A writer in the Soviet periodical New Times said today the Encyclopedia Britannica should stop crediting the invention of radio to Guglielmo Marconi and a German and name as its real inventor Alexander Popov, a Russian physicist who died in 1905. (By "a German" this writer may have meant Heinrich Hertz, who carried out experiments on electromagnetic waves.)

"Marconi invented nothing new," the article said. "He only exactly reproduced Popov's apparatus."

The article said the Britannica editors should know Popov invented and demonstrated the world's first radio receiver May 5, 1895, at Kronstadt fortress near St. Petersburg (Leningrad) and that Popov later got Russian and English patents.

The Encyclopedia Britannica says Marconi applied in 1896 for the first British patent for wireless telegraphy. The encyclopedia credits Clerk Maxwell as having foreseen radio in terms of mathematical formula in 1864 and credits others with having conducted experiments along these lines, but it says Marconi was the first to devise a practical means by which electromagnetic waves provided a new method of telegraphic communication.

OSC Awarded Funds For Science Work

NEW YORK, May 20 (AP)—Oregon State college is among 28 colleges and universities awarded grants for scientific research by the research corporation from funds endowed by Frederick Gardner Cottrell.

The grants total \$175,000 to the schools and are the first of \$2,500,000 planned for five years by the research group.

Papal Envoy Dies In Rome

ROME, May 20 (AP)—Enrico Cardinal Gasparri of Italy, prefect of the supreme tribunal of the Apostolic Signatura, died today at the age of 74.

His death reduced the membership in the Sacred College of Cardinals to 66, four below the maximum of 70.

Three other cardinals have

died this year. They were Pietre Cardinal Boette, archbishop of Genoa; John Cardinal Glennon, archbishop of St. Louis; and Clemens Cardinal von Galen, bishop of Munster (Germany).

Cardinal Gasparri, sub-dean of the sacred college, was a veteran of the Vatican's diplomatic service and spent many years in Latin America on diplomatic assignments.

He was made a cardinal by Pope Pius XI in 1923.

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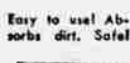
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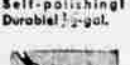
