GRANTS PASS, May 22 (AP)—The Rogue River telephone exchange, the newest in Oregon, will be placed in operation by the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company Thursday, approximately 10 days ahead of the previously announced date of June 1.

Telephone crews have been busy installing telephones for some 100 customers who will be connected with the new exchange, and Western Electric company installers are putting the final touches in the new dial

central office, according to E. K. Miller, manager here.

The new Rogue River exchange, costing an estimated \$2000, is housed in a one-story brick and frame building.
