

Oaks Slide Into First Spot Alone

After tagging along all season a few paces behind the San Francisco Seals, the Oakland Aorns today for the first time clutched the Pacific Coast Baseball league lead by half a game.

While the Seals were idle by rain, Francis Shea, former New York Yankee making his debut for the Aorns, pitched them into the league's top spot on a 6-3 decision last night over the Portland Beavers. It was the Oaks' eighth straight victory.

Beavers Outhit Oaks
Although the Beavers collected 11 safeties to Oakland's six and chased Shea, who was replaced by Rugger Ardizola, the Aorns timed their bingles, opening with a three-run attack in the first inning and adding two in the second. Portland's Relief Pitcher Wandel Mossor, struck out 11 and yielded only two hits from the third through the eighth frame.

The Seals and San Diego Padres scheduled a doubleheader Friday to make up the rained-out engagement.

Hollywood drove the Los Angeles Angels, who enjoyed a momentary perch atop the league for the first time last week, to a third-place berth three and a half games behind Oakland by shutting out the Angels, 8 to 0.

Stars Snap Streak
Xavier Reagin held the Angels to five hits and whiffed nine batters to snap a seven-game losing streak for the Stars. Hollywood pounded the offerings of Dick Erickson and Clem Hausmann for 10 hits.

The Seattle Rainiers swapped their seventh place in the standings with Sacramento's sixth on a 6-2 victory turned in by Lou Tost. Tost allowed 10 hits.

Sparking the Rainiers' 10-hit attack on three Sacramento pitchers was Bob Kahle, recent acquisition of Seattle, who accounted for three runs on two doubles, one with a man aboard in the first and another blow with two on base in the fifth inning.
