OPA Launches Lumber Probe

WASHINGTON, May 22 (AP)—OPA is pinning its hopes for cracking the lumber black market on a new staff of special investigators stationed in 20 areas from coast to coast.

"We're optimistic about our chances for the first time in months," Sidney S. Feinberg, lumber price enforcement chief, told a reporter today.

The agency has assigned 173 investigators to areas which Feinberg said produce more than 80 per cent of the nation's lumber.

These men, Feinberg added, are under the direct supervision of OPA's regional offices—a new approach to the lumber problem. Previously drives against lumber black markets in these areas were conducted by the agency's district offices.

Some of the regional investigators were transferred from district office staffs, but most of them are new and specially trained for the job, Feinberg said. Many, he added, came to OPA from armed services where they had investigative experience.

The new lumber enforcement units were organized in April but did not begin to operate until this month. For the most part, Feinberg said, these agents have headquarters at OPA district offices, although not under their jurisdiction.

The new units are located in cities including Dallas and Houston, Tex.; New Orleans, La.; Spokane and Seattle, Wash.; Portland, Ore.; Phoenix, Ariz., and

Nimitz Endorses Air Policy Board

WASHINGTON, May 22 (AP)—Fleet Admiral Chester W. Nimitz, chief of naval operations, today endorsed a proposed national air policy board to help coordinate national defense and civilian transportation developments.

Nimitz appeared before a senate interstate commerce subcommittee which is considering legislation by Senator Mitchell (D-Wash.), who deplored a lack of coordination between government agencies and private industry in aviation matters.

Salem Votes Raise In City Bus Fares

SALEM, May 22 (AP)—A one cent city bus fare increase was approved by a special city council session last night and Oregon Motor Stages announced it would seek similar rates in Eugene.

The council action, taken without discussion or opposition, sets rates at 8 cents for a single fare, four tokens from 25 to 30 cents and student 20-ride books from \$1 to \$1.25.

Big Housing Bill Signed By Truman

WASHINGTON, May 22 (AP)—President Truman today signed legislation designed to facilitate the private construction of 2,700,000 new homes within the next two years.

Housing Administrator Wilson R. Wyatt said "this throws the veterans' housing program into high gear."

The legislation was sent to the president after a long and bitter battle in congress, during which the house once emphatically rejected the proposed use of \$600,000,000 in subsidies to stimulate production of scarce building materials. However, the house later reversed itself and agreed to \$400,000,000 for subsidies.

In addition to subsidies, here's what the new law does:

- Increases by \$1,000,000,000 the government authority to insure home mortgage loans, meaning the government would take that big a risk in the construction of homes for veterans. Thus, a veteran or other person could purchase a home with a small down payment and the government would protect the mortgage for the remainder;
- Continues to December 31, 1947, the war granted priorities and allocation authority for channeling scarce building materials into construction of low and medium priced homes, in city or country;
- Gives veterans preference in the purchase or rental of new houses;
- Puts price ceilings on new houses;
- Grants broad authority to

the housing expediter to issue directives to other government agencies, including OPA, on prices of building materials;
6. Authorizes the expediter to stop or curb export of lumber

as long as scarcities exist in this country.
Congress rejected all proposals to put ceiling prices on existing dwellings.
