## Sno-Cat Trip Made To Park

Thomas C. Parker, assistant superintendent, Crater Lake national park, Maxwell Wood, public relations officer of Bonneville Power administration and Clarence Swallow, assistant to Wood, went into the park by snow-cat Tuesday afternoon.

Mrs. Parker and Mrs. Wood were with the party. They enjoyed dinner at headquarters and returned to Klamath Falls the same evening.

Parker went up to the park again Wednesday and will remain the rest of the week. He reported two plows are working in two shifts, totaling 16 hours a day, clearing a one-way road which has reached to within about two miles of Annie Spring. Three or four inches of new snow fell at the park Tuesday. Deer are already reported returning to the park, working down Annie creek canyon to the mill lick. One buck and two fawns were seen by the visitors Tuesday, standing in the snow.

The road will definitely not be opened to the rim until June 1, Parker stated.

## State Fruit and Vegetable Exports May Set New Mark

SALEM, May 22 (P)—Carlott shipments of fresh fruits and vegetables from Oregon to other states will set a new record of 35,350 cars in the year beginning next July 1, the state department of agriculture estimated today.

The estimate is for the 1946 crop, while 1945 crop shipments totaled 35,000 cars, the record to date.

The department estimated great expansion in the Klamath Falls and Ontario districts, with a greater volume of lettuce and onion shipments from Malheur county.

In the Redmond district, new plantings on irrigated lands of the Madras area will be offset by a drop in other lands of the district.

The department estimated that potatoes, largest single exported item of the 1945 crop, again will top the list this year. Potato shipments from the 1945 crop totaled 18,300 cars of 360 sacks each.

Onions will take second place with 5000 cars, while peaches will be third with 4800.

Here are the shipping prospects by districts for the year beginning July 1, the shipments including only those sent outside the state:

Ontario 8810, Milton 1580, Hood River 3775, Portland 840, Salem 2400, Redmond 2565, Medford 3080, Klamath Falls 12,300.

The department will employ 100 men this year to inspect the shipments.

Oregon wheat producers will

almost reach the goal of 750,000 bushels of wheat delivered by the May 25 deadline for export to foreign famine areas. The estimate is between 600,000 and 700,000 bushels.

The commodity credit corporation has placed a second million bushels of wheat with northwest millers for making into flour. Out of each million bushels, 4500 tons of feed will remain here.

Farmers, who have been praying for rain during April and May, are getting it, but the department doesn't know yet if there is enough to help parched crops and pastures. Top soils have dried out. The spring-sown crops are in the worst

shape, while fall-seeded crops are in fair shape.

## County Taxes 95% Paid Up

Approximately 95 per cent, or \$1,984,833.20, of the total property tax due in Klamath county for 1945-46 has been collected to date, Mrs. Elsie Siemens of the tax collector's office said today.

The remaining five per cent includes some assessments which have had no payments at all made and others which are being paid quarterly. About two-thirds of the county's taxpayers paid their assessments in full.

Third quarter payments became delinquent May 15. In the past six months the tax office has also collected \$133,578.31 in delinquent taxes. Total of the 1945-46 tax roll is \$2,083,968.02. All taxes collected from July 1, 1945, to the present time repre-

sent 1014 per cent of the current tax roll.

The oldest quarter on delinquent year taxes, known as the 10th quarter, must be paid by August 15, 1946, to avoid interest. Fourth quarter current taxes are payable now.
