

NL Already In Stretch Chase

Baseball followers were envisioning today another down-to-the-wire neck and neck pennant race between the Brooklyn Dodgers and St. Louis Cardinals, such as the two top National League contenders staged in the hectic 1941 and '42 seasons.

The war temporarily halted their rivalry, but with the return of their prewar stars, the two teams have picked up where they left off four years ago.

For the third consecutive day, the Brawling Brooks and Classy Cards continued in a first place deadlock following yesterday's significant triumphs.

The Cards, in particular, showed marks of a champion when they whipped the New York Giants 4-1 despite the threat of a moral letdown as a result of the possible loss of three of their star players to the Mexican Baseball league. It was just before the game that the players learned of the "departure" of Star Pitchers Max Lanier and Fred Martin and Second Baseman Lou Klein.

Brooklyn kept pace with the Cards by taking its second 2-1 decision over the Chicago Cubs, this time going into the 11th inning to win as compared to 13 innings on Wednesday.

Pre-Game Brawl
The game was an anti-climax to a pregame brawl between the two clubs which involved nearly all the members of both teams before it was broken up by police. The only serious injury suffered by any combatant was the loss of a tooth by Brooklyn's Dixie Walker.

National League President Ford Frick assessed \$150 fines to Len Merullo and Coach Red Smith of the Cubs and Walker and \$100 fines to Brooklyn's Pee-wee Reese and Chicago's Phil Cavarretta. In addition, Frick suspended Walker and Smith for five days and Merullo for eight days.

The race in the American league was narrowed when the New York Yankees outslugged the Detroit Tigers 12-6 while Cleveland shaded Boston's leading Red Sox 3-2 in 10 innings. Boston's first margin this season was reduced to five games.

Successful Homers
Bashing out three successive homers to tie a major league record the Yanks routed four Tiger hurlers for eight successive hits and as many runs in a ferocious fifth frame to come from behind. Joe DiMaggio, Nick Etten and Joe Gordon were the circuit clouters, with Gordon accounting for his second of the game.

Pittsburgh, led by Rookie Outfielder Ralph Kiner's two home runs and double, drubbed the Philadelphia Phils 10-2. One of Kiner's circuit smashes was a grand slam home run in the opening frame against Tommy Hughes. Rookie Eson Bahr, making his first start in the majors, held the Phils to eight hits.

Rains Spell High Waters For Fishing

Five Local Pool Records Tumble To KUHS Swimmers

Five swim records tumbled during the high school's interclass aquatic meet in the KUHS pool Wednesday afternoon, and three of the new marks were hung up by Herbert Brown, swimming for the junior class.

The water meet was the last sports event for high school athletes on the season's calendar.

Brown stroked the 35-yard free style in 19 seconds flat, paring three-tenths of a second off the old mark; swam the 70-yard free style in 44.4 seconds, 1.6 seconds less than the old meet record, and turned the 140-yard free style in 1:55 flat, 13 seconds better than the previous low.

Brown set a new mark by stroking the 210-yard free style in 3:34.1, 13.4 seconds below the old mark, and the sophomore swim team won the 140-yard relay by setting a new mark of 1 minute 30 seconds, cutting 20.5 seconds off the old mark.

The junior class capped the meet with a total of 38 points, the sophomores trailed with 19, seniors placed third with three and freshmen were last with two.

Freak Bingle Gives Oakland 10th Win

Les Scarcella, heaviest slugger of Oakland's rampaging A's, blooped a winning run without trying and stretched the gap between the A's and their nearest rival in the Pacific Coast baseball league to two and a half games.

The strong contender for league home run honors tried to duck the pitch that lost the game for the Portland Beavers last night. The ball hit Scarcella's bat handle as he stepped back, looped closely down the foul line for a hit and drove in the tally for a 1-0 victory. The baseball curved shortly into the outfield after Scarcella, looking for a foul, had slowed down.

Tony Sabal, who had singled and advanced on a bunt and an infield out, crossed the plate. Tenth Straight

Oakland's victory gave Veteran Charley Gassaway his fifth win of the season and brought the A's record to 10 straight wins and 23 in the last 30 games. Dick Barrett of the Beavers limited the Oaks to five hits in seven innings before he was lifted for a pinch hitter.

San Diego's giant-killing Padres sank the second-place San Francisco Seals, erstwhile pace-setters of the league, deeper behind the Oaks on a 3-1 victory, the second in a row for the Padres. Al Lien gave San Diego five walks which paved the way for the Padres' victory.

In the seventh and eighth innings he gave three tickets to first which, coupled with a pair of hits, were worth a run in each frame. Al Olsen, the winning pitcher, allowed the Seals seven safeties.

Stars Sink Angels
Hollywood's Stars continued their reverse of form in sinking the Los Angeles Angels, 4 to 3, for the third consecutive time, after taking a seven-game lam-basting from Oakland last week. The sixth straight defeat shoved the third-ranking Angels, only serious contender besides the Seals and Oaks in the pennant

chase so far, to five and a half games behind the pinnacle.

Catcher Al Unser cracked out a seventh inning homer with one aboard to pull the Stars abreast of the Angels, and Hollywood put over the winning run in the eighth frame.

Grandstand Finish
At Seattle, \$100,000 First Baseman Earl Torgeson poled a homer with full bases and two out in the tenth inning for a 6-2 decision by the Seattle Rainiers over the Sacramento Solons.

Torgeson, recently sold to the Boston Braves for \$100,000 and players, smacked one of Relief Pitcher Al Jarrett's offerings 375 feet to wrap up the game. The victory gave Seattle a 2-1 advantage in the current series and placed the Rainiers in sixth place, shoving the Solons down to seventh.

Joe Walcott Gets Big Chance Tonight
NEW YORK, May 24 (P)—Jersey Joe Walcott, the Camden, N. J. father of six children who has jumped into the fistie time-light at 32 years, gets his big chance tonight.
