

Reprimand To Admiral On Navy Property Loss Told In Senate Report

WASHINGTON, May 24 (AP)—The senate war investigating committee today released a report on the theft or loss of some \$30,000 worth of clocks, pressure cookers and other articles from navy patrol bomber planes.

The report said Secretary of Navy James V. Forrestal had informed senators of "administrative disciplinary action" against Vice Admiral Robert C. Giffen and four other naval officers in charge of the naval air station at San Juan, Puerto Rico, between May and October of last year. Giffen, the report said, received a "severe reprimand."

The San Juan report was made a part of the committee's official record as the senators resumed hearings on what Chairman Mead (D-NY) termed "irregularities in business operations conducted by the navy at Pearl Harbor," Hawaii.

Senator Mead said these hearings "will explore illegal and improper procurement and diversion of government property and funds in the case known as the submarine ships service stores."

George Meader, committee counsel, said the "severe reprimand" for Admiral Giffen was the first of its kind in naval history against so high ranking an officer.

Secretary Forrestal thanked the senate committee for appraising the navy of the San Juan case and also reported he had sent a "severe reprimand" to Capt. Frank E. Weld, letters of reprimand to Lt. Comdr. E. W. Paynter and Lt. Clinton W. Kneass, former supply officers there; and a letter of admonition to Comdr. Nicholas M. Rowinski.

Infant Death Cause Found

NEW YORK, May 24 (AP)—The army today identified as summer diarrhea the disease which caused the death of four babies and made seriously ill 17 others who arrived in the United States recently aboard the bride ship Zebulon Vance.

Two other babies, one in Pittsburgh and one in Paris, Ill., have died, but the army investigating board which named the disease said their diagnosis applied only to the four who died in New York. The baby who died in Pittsburgh arrived Sunday on the Brazil.

The board said cause of the outbreak of the disease had not been determined. Mothers of the children have said unsanitary conditions on overcrowded ships were responsible, although the army reported from Paris that the Vance carried 40 fewer passengers than capacity.

The board's statement declared the disease is not uncommon and "occurs in hospitals and other institutions where large numbers of new-born infants and older infants up to the age of 12 months live in close contact."

Vet Home Loan Increase Asked

PORTLAND, May 24 (AP)—Folger Johnson, state federal housing authority director, said today he would ask the FHA commissioner to raise price limitations for title VI home loan insurance in this area.

Surveys will be made to show that houses cannot be well built here under top prices specified, he stated. Applications are being accepted, however, for loans up to \$5400 for single-family houses; \$7500, two-family; \$9500, three-family, and \$12,000, four-family. The regulations are part of the veterans emergency housing act.

Government Studies Dairy Price Boosts

WASHINGTON, May 24 (AP)—The price housewives pay for butter, milk and cheese may be boosted, a government official said today, to give farmers more money to buy feed for cows.

The only alternative, said this official who declined use of his name, is another increase in government subsidies to farmers to offset the higher costs of dairy feed.

In any event, he added, OPA, the agriculture department and the office of economic stabilization expect to make a decision within a few days.
