In Concert

The following is a radio comment on a symphony concert in Stockton, California, in which Mrs. Beatrice Walton Bodley, formerly of Klamath Falls, was soloist on May 6.

"The nineteenth season of the Stockton Symphony orchestra came to a triumphant close last evening, with Beatrice Walton Bodley sharing honors with Maestro Franko Silva. Almost every seat in the high school auditorium was filled, and the audience rose to heights of enthusiasm which expressed itself in shouts of applause and cries of 'Bravo!' This extraordinary acclaim came at the conclusion of Edouard Grieg's Concerto in A Minor for piano and orchestra, with Beatrice Walton Bodley at the keyboard. Mrs. Bodley was magnificent! She has sweep and power; she has imagination and the strength to soar to the composer's heights, no matter how transcendent they may be. She was perfectly matched to the seventy-five-piece orchestra, and at no time was Maestro Silva called upon to temper the orchestra to any frailty of the soloist. Mrs. Bodley's work is notable for its tone quality. We've heard pianists whose tonal quality decreased as technique increased. Mrs. Bodley's pure, clear, resonant tone is never lost in the brilliance of her technique."

The Stockton newspapers also gave equally high praise to Mrs. Bodley's performance.

Beatrice Walton Bodley began her musical career in Klamath Falls at an early age. At her first recital, she was so small that her teacher, Mrs. Don Zumwalt, sat beside her to do the pedal work for her. After graduating from the Merrill high school, she finished a four-year course in music at the College of the Pacific, then in San Jose, Calif. After her marriage to Mr. Russell Bodley, who is a member of the faculty of the Conservatory of Music of that college, she and Mr. Bodley went to Paris twice for special music study.

Mrs. Bodley has a large class of piano pupils in Stockton. Her many friends here will rejoice in her great success.
