

# Vet Flees Hospital, Kills Self

PORTLAND, May 27 (AP)—George Farnham, 25, Renton, Wash., who was missing from the Roseburg, Ore., veterans hospital, shot himself in an apartment here yesterday with a policeman's revolver he snatched while police tried to seize him.

The coroner's office reported Farnham barricaded himself in a room, fired at police, then took his own life after officers tossed tear gas bombs into the room.

Farnham left the Roseburg hospital Thursday, police reported. They said he had visited here with friends who notified police that the discharged air corps veteran spoke of suicide. The gun was snatched from Patrolman D. M. Potter as he and another officer tried to persuade Farnham to return to the hospital.

Police threw tear gas bombs into the apartment to prevent Farnham from shooting into crowds of spectators who gathered near the building.

Roseburg hospital officials reported Farnham, a Portlander, was admitted March 9 for treatment.

An auction was hastily arranged and some 500 bargain seekers paid a total of \$625 for the chicks.

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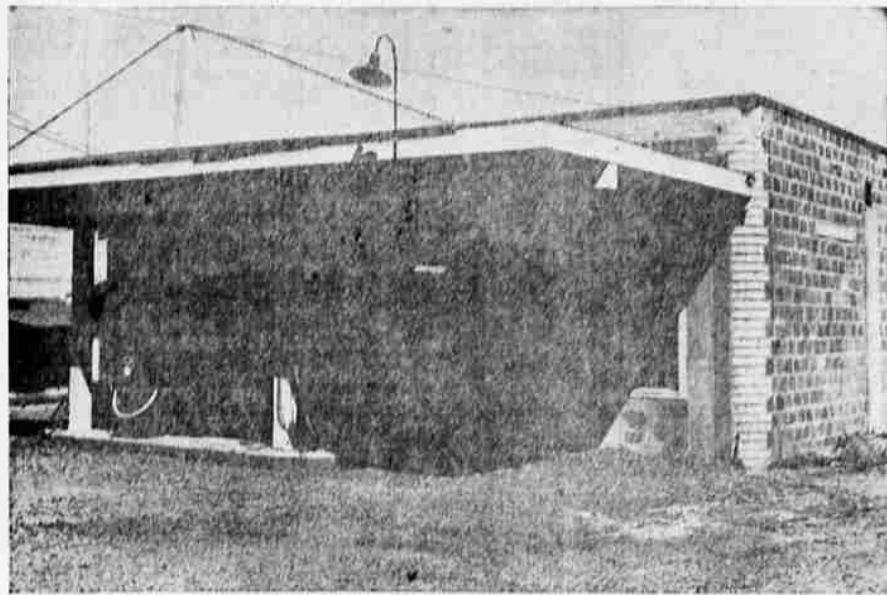
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## New Store In Keno

## Motor Stages Run Thursday

PORTLAND, May 27 (AP)—Highway schedules of Oregon motor stages, strike bound since April 5, will be operating by Thursday in western Oregon, the company reported today.

Settlement of the 51-day-old deep over-the-road buses linking Portland with coast and up-state cities was reached yesterday after intervention of Gov.

ernor Snell and a state conciliator.

The contract calls for \$1.30 for drivers with one-year service and \$1 to \$1.45 for shop workers, retroactive to Jan. 1. The 300 members of the AFL Motor Coach Employees union originally asked \$1.40 top for drivers and \$1.50 top for mechanics.

Union business agent Harold Onthes said other issues also had been compromised.

A. L. Schneider, company general manager, said buses would operate on the regular summer schedule but that it would re-

quire three days to get all the firm's 125 buses in condition.

Company buses operated as city transportation systems at Eugene and Salem resumed service May 19 under separate contract.
