## Teen-Age Boys Peril Traffic

"Souped-up" cars are becoming a problem for traffic officers and juvenile officials, and at least three arrests have been made in the past few days for reckless driving by teen-agers.

Gerald Murray, juvenile officer, said that yesterday a 16-year-old boy was picked up Sunday, his renovated model Ford impounded and his driving privileges revoked for 60 days after he was observed driving recklessly and speeding.

The boy was seen by police officers several times Sunday afternoon driving through town and his driving was tabbed as "reckless" on Main, Klamath and S. 6th. A patrolman observed him spin around to S. 6th from Klamath on two wheels, put on his brakes and swerve toward parked cars, then straighten up and speed away before he could be apprehended.

Even though 16-year-olds are granted driving licenses, the state juvenile law interpretation takes traffic cases of persons under 18 away from city and state police and the problem is one for juvenile officers, Murray said.

His most effective way of halting wild juvenile drivers is to order the cars impounded.

## Johnson Quits As Inspector

Gus G. Johnson, city building inspector since September, 1945, resigned Monday from that post.

He has requested that his resignation take effect immediately. Explaining his reason for resigning, Johnson stated that due to increased business and maintenance work at Harriman lodge at Rocky Point which he and Mrs. Johnson operate, his full time will be required there. He has been a resident of Klamath county for many years.

The city council in accepting his resignation expressed gratitude to Johnson for his work as building inspector.

## Tax Disallowed For Coffee Shop

Among firms penalized \$1000 or more in income tax disallowance is Max's Coffee shop, 535 Main, which was penalized \$1500 for violating wartime wage regulations through payment of illegal wages.

There were 18 Oregon firms involved but all voluntarily admitted their violations and consented to the finding. John B. McCourt, chairman of the 12th regional wage stabilization board of the enforcement division said, and pointed out that in voluntary admissions the amount of disallowance is usually less than it would otherwise be under board policies.

Allen Ambrose Reeder, 5417 Homedale, who told state police that "everything seems to happen" to him when he drove a car, was to appear in justice court this afternoon to answer a charge of driving during a period of revocation, the action growing out of an accident near Pinehurst on the Greensprings highway Saturday evening.

Reeder was arrested by state police after Gordon Ashcraft of Ashland told officers a grey coupe hit his car and then sped away. When police stopped Reeder they found blue paint, apparently from Ashcraft's car, on the rear fender. Any further charge will probably be filed in Jackson county by Ashcraft, police said, as the incident did not occur in Klamath county. Officers said Reeder sidestepped the Ashcraft car and failed to stop at the scene of the accident.
