

# Solons Sizzle As AL Pursuit Narrows Down

Washington's five-star pitching staff, with its accent on dipping knucklers and darting pluttering pitches, looms as the latest stumbling block in Boston's pennant path.

Only seven games off the pace and a scant half game out of the runner-up spot, Ozzie Bluege's Nationals have "fluttered" into the chase on a sizzling two-week record of 11 wins in their last 14 starts.

Dutch Leonard's latest success was a neat 2-1 effort against New York last night, spoiling both Bill Dickey's home debut as Joe McCarthy's successor and the Yankee stadium's first night game.

Larry MacPhail outdid himself with the finest lighting plant in baseball floodlights but the Yankees still couldn't see Leonard flitting "dippy doodles." In fact Leonard himself administered the fatal blow to Freshman Clarence Marshall's chances when he singled home a run in the fourth inning to break a 1-1 tie.

Topcoat weather, a threat of rain and a chilly wind combined to cut the opening attendance to 48,895 paid, still the largest afterdark crowd of the season.

**Sox Rained Out**  
Detroit also closed in on the leaders, picking up a half game on the Red Sox who were rained out of their tilt with Philadelphia. Freddy Hutchinson, labeled the "\$75,000 lemming" in prewar days, accounted for his second victory, 6-1, allowing only five Cleveland hits. Hutchinson collected two of the Tigers' nine safeties off Red Embree and Ed Kleiman.

The Chicago White Sox ripped off their fourth straight triumph for their new skipper, Ted Lyons, slugging three St. Louis Browns hurriers for 15 hits and a 9-2 romp. They knocked out Starter Stan Ferns with four runs in the first inning and Orval Grove coasted home on a five-hitter.

Since that time, however, word has been received that Memorial Day might not be a holiday for some of the Redding players, and a team might not be fielded.

A flurry of telephone calls are being made today with the league headquarters in Mt. Shasta, but the outcome is still indefinite.

As there is no paper tomorrow, the final decision on whether a game is to be played will be broadcast over KFLW tonight and tomorrow.

Postponement of last Sunday's game puts both Redding and Klamath one game behind the league and will have to be made up sometime during the season. The Sox' next scheduled game is with Mt. Shasta at Mt. Shasta Sunday.

# Unearned Run Bests Liska In 14 Frames

Young Gerald Staley of Sacramento today boasts a 14-inning pitching mark which failed to outlast but won over the staying power of the Pacific Coast Baseball league's persistent veteran, Ad Liska of the Portland Beavers.

The 14-inning duel between the two pitchers last night produced a 1-0 victory for Sacramento on an unearned run, in holding the Beavers to four hits over the prolonged stretch, dealing no walks and fanning five.

Submariner Liska built up a reputation over the years for seeing ball games through. He pitched 319 innings, the most in the league, in 1937, and in 1941 completed 30 games for the top number that year. He hurled seven shutouts for the 1943 record.

**Ad's Seventh Loss**  
Last night Liska allowed nine hits, but a wild throw from Third Baseman Glen Crawford to first let in the tally that beat him. It was Liska's seventh loss this season against a single win.

The San Francisco Seals climbed to within a game of the league-leading Oakland A's, rained out last night at Seattle, on a 4-1 win over the Hollywood Stars. The San Diego Padres pounced on Los Angeles for a 6-2 decision, sinking the third-place Angels to four and a half games behind the leaders.

Larry Jansen, leading game winner of the league, limited the Stars to six safeties in his 11th victory against two defeats. Slugging Ferris Fair opened a fourth-inning spurge for the Seals with a single. Dino Restelli walked, Joe Hoover doubled, Don Trower singled and the Seals profited from a Hollywood error to count three runs before the Ad's seventh loss.

**Chick Evans Beaten In British Amateur**  
BIRKDALE, Eng., May 29 (AP)—Chick Evans, veteran Chicago golfer, was eliminated from the British Amateur championship today on the 19th hole of his fourth match after the youthful Frank Stranahan of Toledo had turned in an easy triumph in his third-round match.

Evans took a par five on the extra hole while his opponent, Capt. Edward Browne of the royal armored corps got a birdie four for the 450-yard hole.

Stranahan, the only other American entrant, whipped Marshall Robertson, 5 and 4.

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# Nelson Seen As Favorite Over Briton

NEWTON, Mass., May 29 (AP)—PGA Champion Byron Nelson ruled a top-heavy favorite to defeat Dick Burton, the British Open tilt, in the opening championship challenge golf match in almost a quarter-century today on the Charles River Country club's long and tricky course.

Nelson, who will be playing that layout for the first time since he bested seven top local rivals in easy fashion in the "Big Eight" tourney four years ago, is in fine form for this competition, while his British opponent arrived from England only Monday and has yet to rid himself of "sea-legs."

Burton will be further handicapped because he has just returned from five years' military service and had little opportunity to regain his pre-war skill which brought him the British title in 1939—the last year that championship tournament was held.
