

Northwest Flood Dangers Pass As Rivers Retreat

Relief was in sight this morning at northwest flood areas—around the Columbia and Willamette river lowlands, and the flatlands in the vicinity of Bonners Ferry, Idaho—as swollen rivers were reported to have reached their high point and had begun to recede.

Most anxiety was felt near Bonners Ferry, as more than 500 emergency volunteer workers labored around the clock to plug and repair threatened dikes with sandbags as the steadily rising Kootenai river reached within

Paper Lack Forces Cut In Journals

Does your newspaper look a bit smaller than it used to? Do you find news and advertising jammed in with fewer and smaller headlines, fewer pictures, fewer features?

Very likely you do, if you've been observing—and if it's only of your own paper you didn't get in the paper, you noticed it, all right, and probably told the editor about it.

But throughout the country the newspaper supply has shrunk. Oregon's publishers have joined in the fruitless quest for more paper, and, not finding it, have been forced to slash news, advertising and features.

The situation, difficult for months, has become critical with the loggers' strike in British Columbia whose mills supply many United States newspapers.

All Oregon papers hit
All Oregon newspapers are in more or less the same predicament, their problem varying only in the degree of its seriousness. The Eugene Register-Guard, for example, estimates its paper supply at 45 per cent of its needs. The Pendleton East Oregonian, on the other hand, believes its supply, by extreme conservation and running a "tight" newspaper, will be adequate.

The Register-Guard has reduced its coming and cut them to tabloid size, discontinued its serial story and other features, reduced its advertising and trimmed its news, heads and pictures.

The Grants Pass Courier experimented with a five-column tabloid newspaper one day a week for which it rejected display advertising. For mechanical reasons it abandoned the tabloid and went back to the full-sized page, but fewer of them. It's one day a week without advertising—which means, of course, without revenue—may be increased to two, in an effort to stretch a three-month paper supply over four months.

Advertising Spread Out
The Baker Democrat-Herald induced merchants to spread their advertising evenly through the week to avoid space-consuming peaks. At Corvallis, the Gazette-Times eliminated a supplemental advertising section. The Salem Capital Journal and the Salem Statesman both skipped Memorial Day publications—as did many others—as a further step in their general belt-tightening.

Portland newspapers, too, are in the same spot. Both the Journal and the Oregonian on April 1 made cuts approximating 15 per cent in the size of their papers. Unless the situation eases, they may be forced to further reductions.

The general attitude throughout the state—as in the country—is summed up by the Klamath Falls Herald and News which is "rationing advertising, limiting certain types of advertising, using smaller type for certain matter, running tight papers and praying daily for something good to happen to us."

Vet Priority Quota Exhausted In State
PORTLAND, May 31 (AP)—Western Oregon's quota of 786 veterans' priorities for houses costing \$7000 or more is exhausted, Folger Johnson, state federal housing administration director, said today.

He reported about 180 priorities remain for houses of less than \$7000. New quotas will be set after June 30, he said.

Veterans who want to build may get priorities from an emergency pool by personal application, Johnson said.

Eastern Oregon has only a few higher-bracket priorities left.
